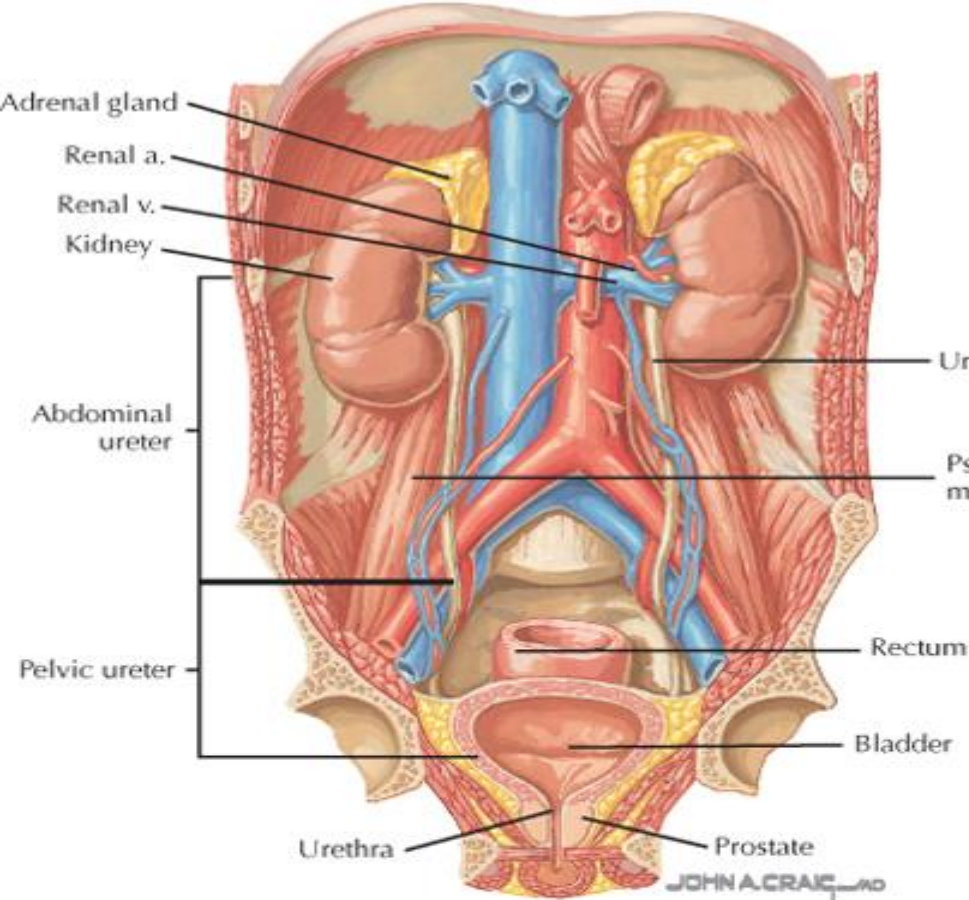

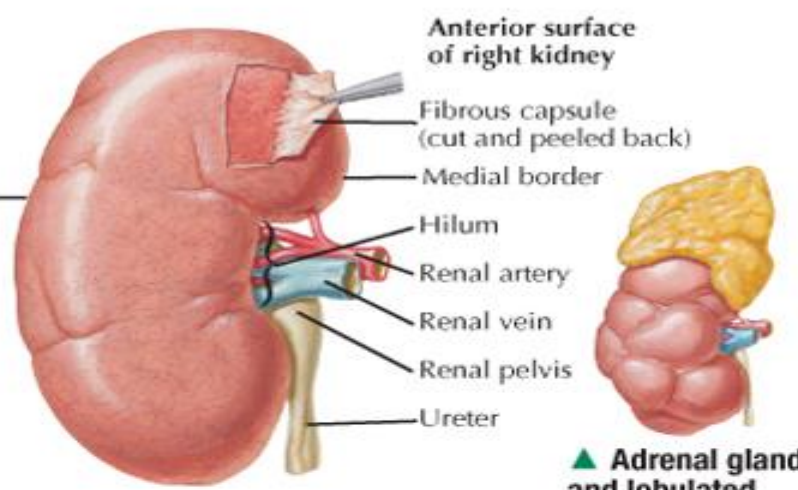

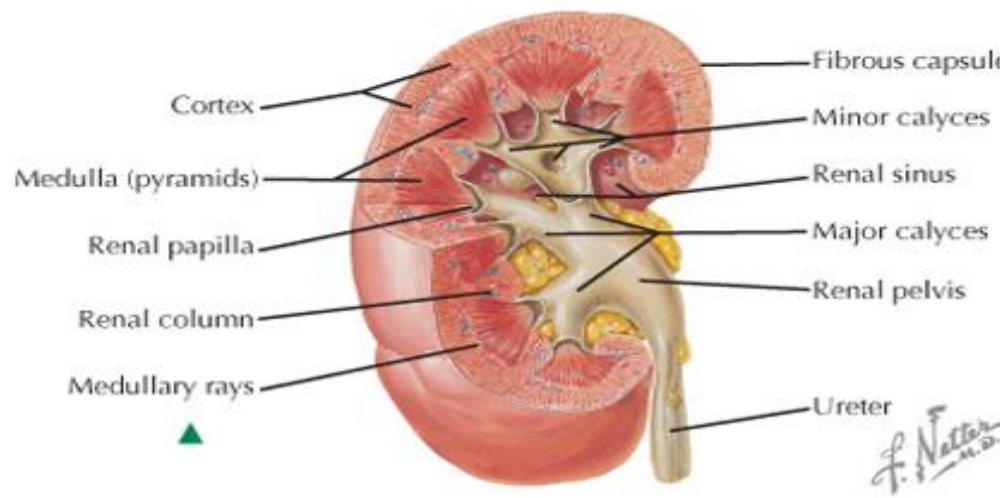


▲ **Regional anatomy of the urinary system.** The kidneys, embedded in fat, lie in a retroperitoneal position (behind the peritoneum, outside the abdominal cavity), just anterior to muscles of the posterior abdominal wall.

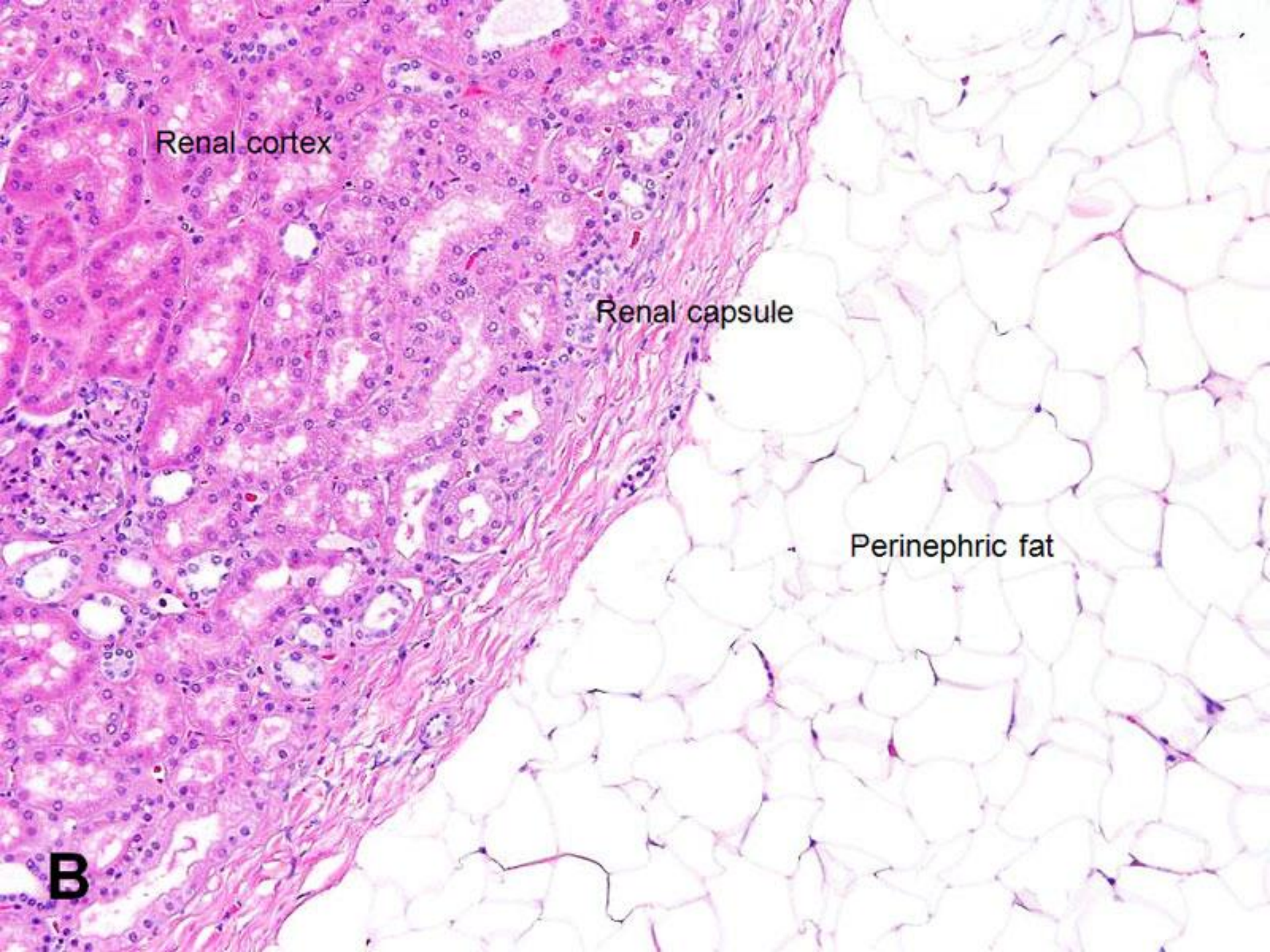
▼ **Gross structure of the kidney.**

▲ **Right kidney sectioned in several planes, exposing parenchyma and renal pelvis.**

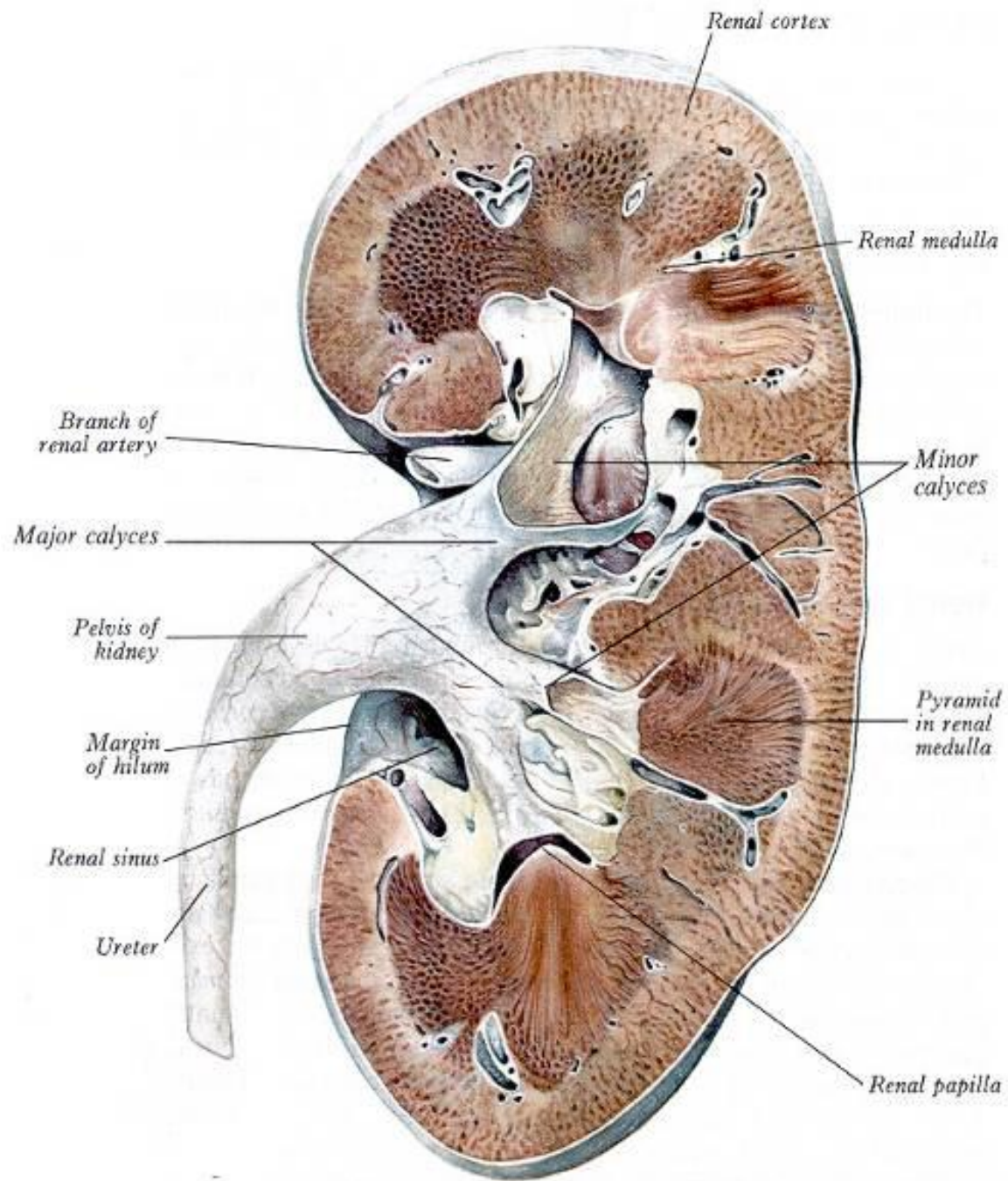

# Histologic composition of kidney

- **Vascular component**
  - Arteries (arterial portal system)
  - Capillaries
    - Glomerulus (capillaries with pores)
    - Peritubular capillary network (fenestrated capillaries)
    - Vasa recta
  - Veins
- **Renal tubules (tubular component)**
  - Nephron
  - Collecting tubules
- **Renal interstitium**
  - loose connective tissue, interstitial cels (erythropoietin), mesangium



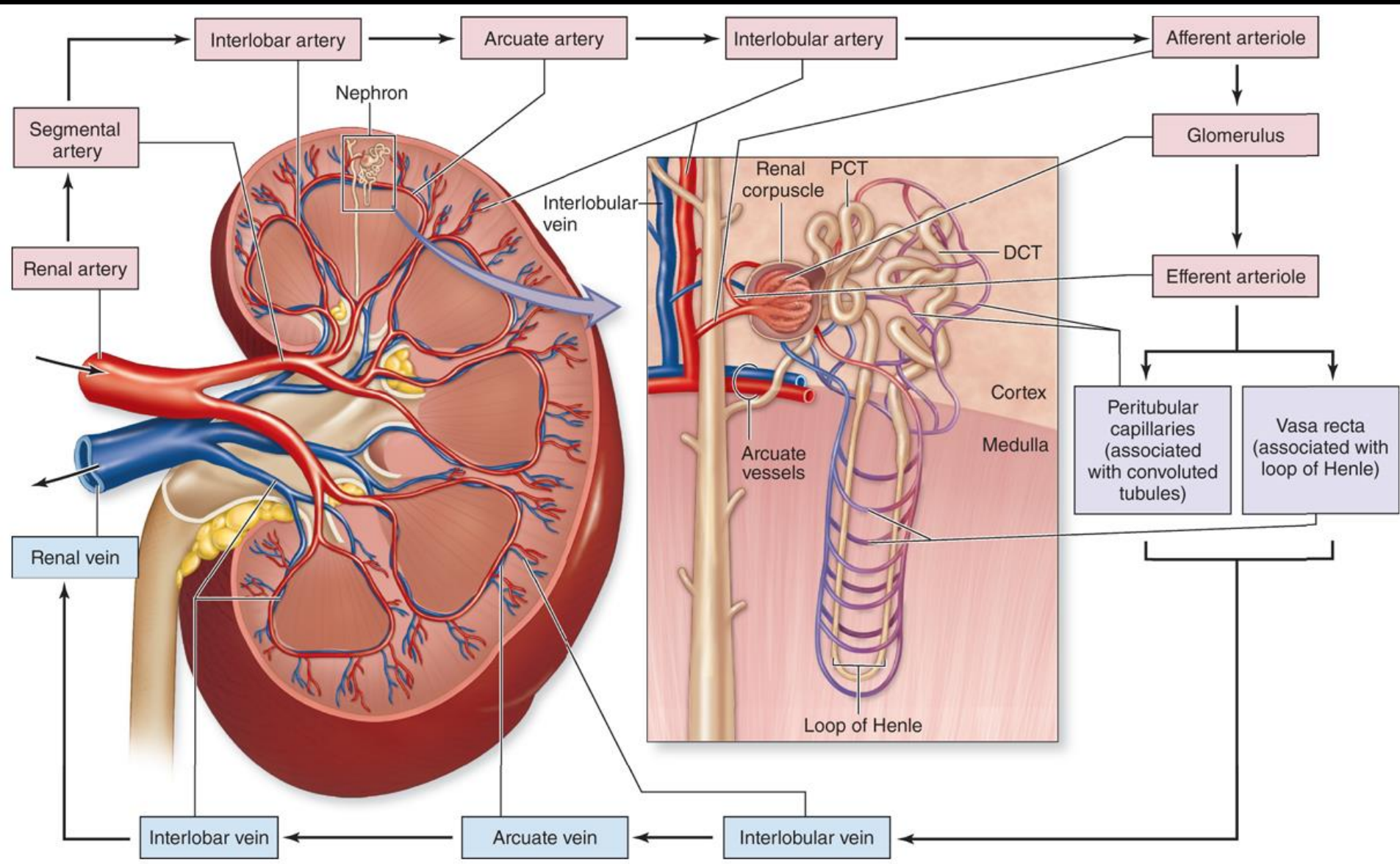

# Nephron – basic morphologic and functional unit of the kidney

- **Bowman's capsule**
  - Part of the renal corpuscle (Malpighi)
  - Filtration function – primary urine 180 l/day
- **Tubules of the nephron**
  - Epithelial tubes going from Bowman's capsule
  - Urine adjustment
  - Proximal tubule, intermediate tubule, distal tubule

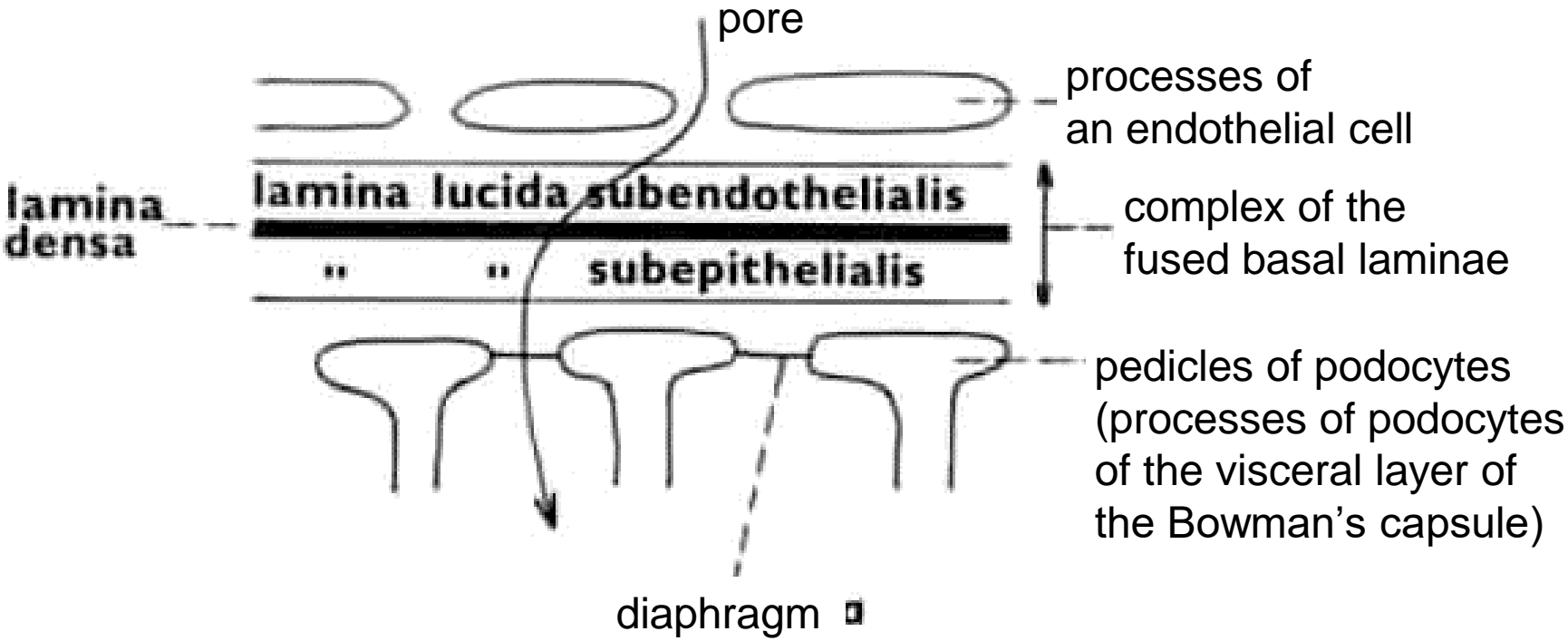




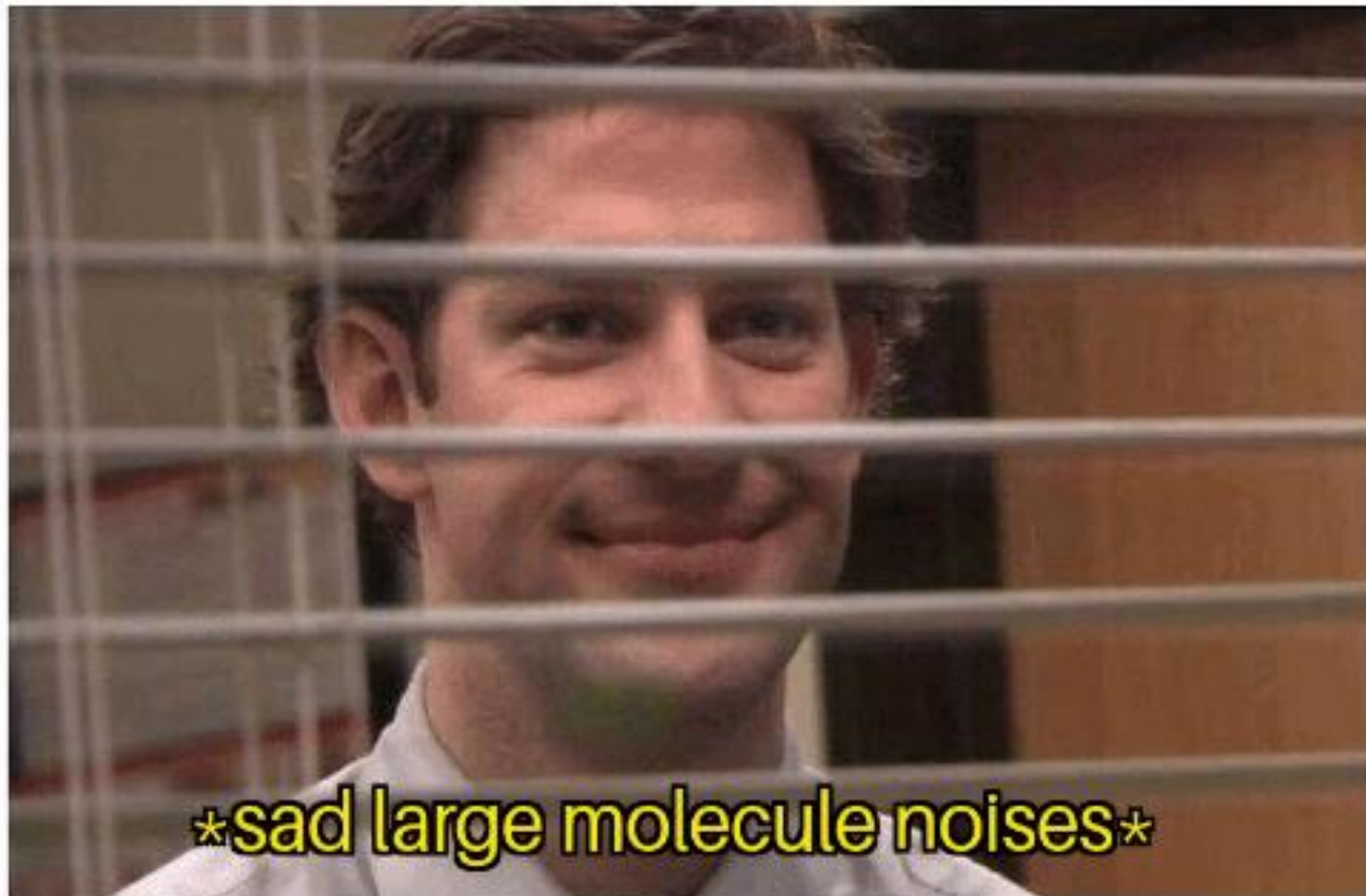




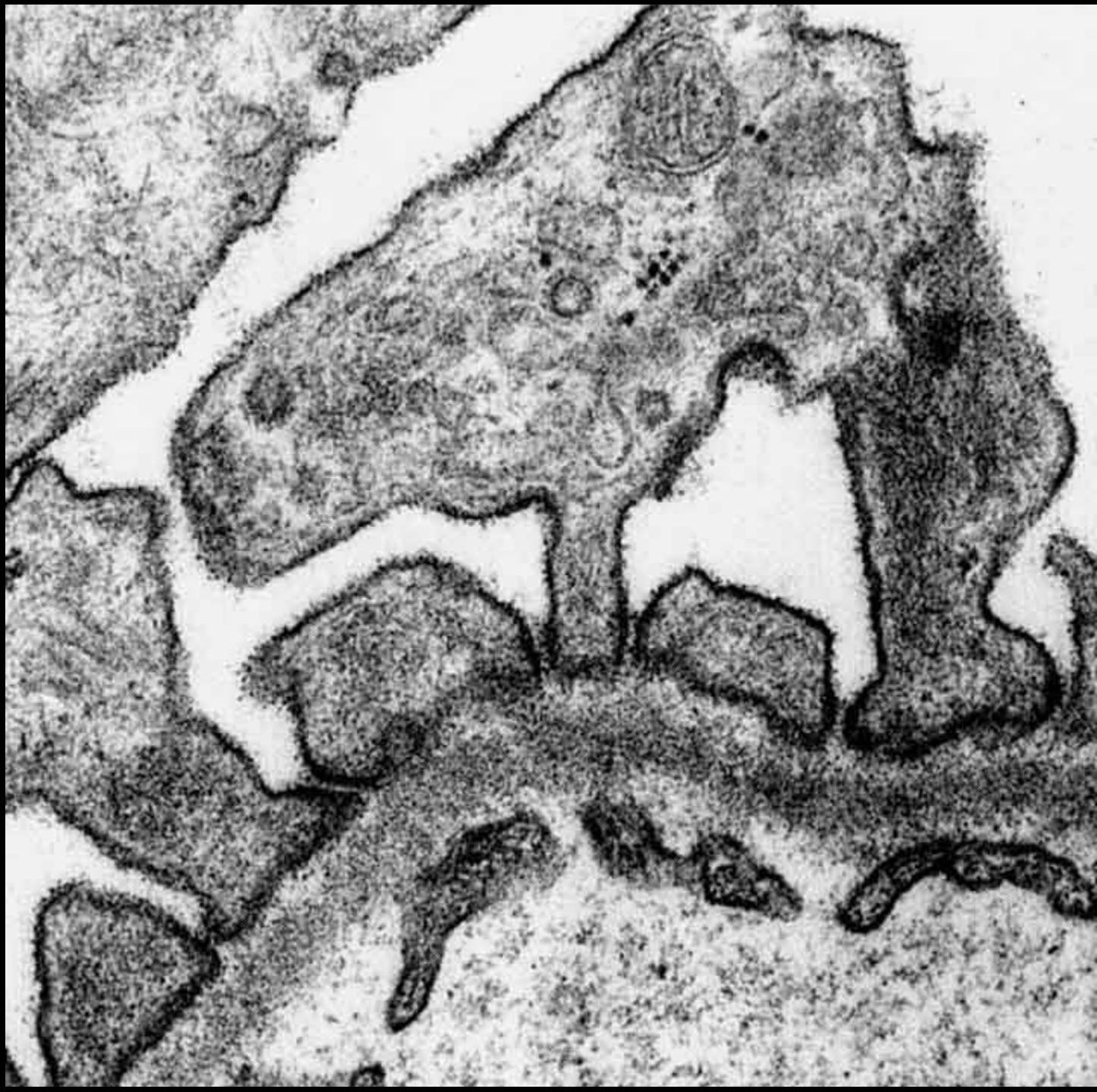
# FILTRATION BARRIER OF THE RENAL CORPUSCLE

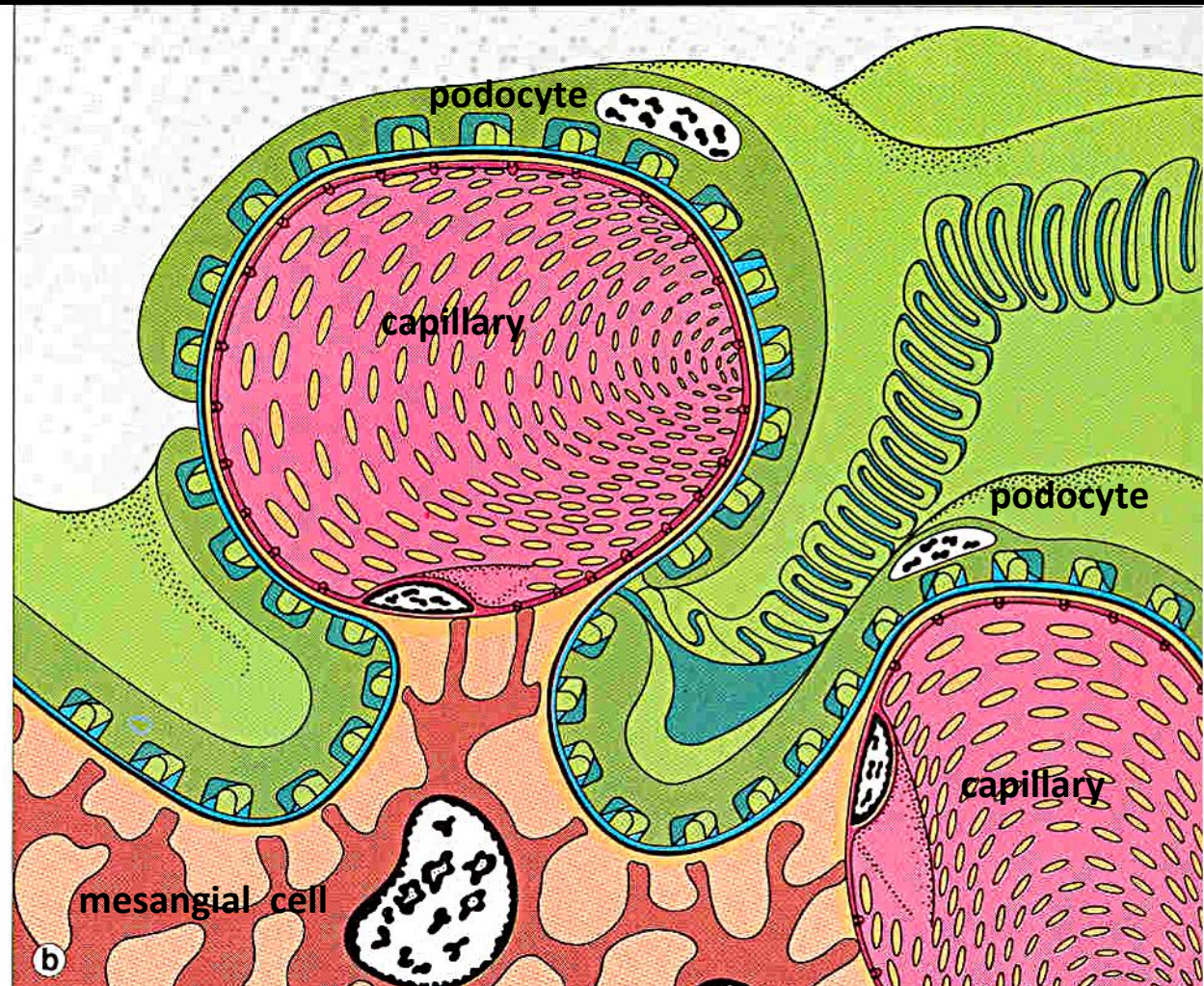
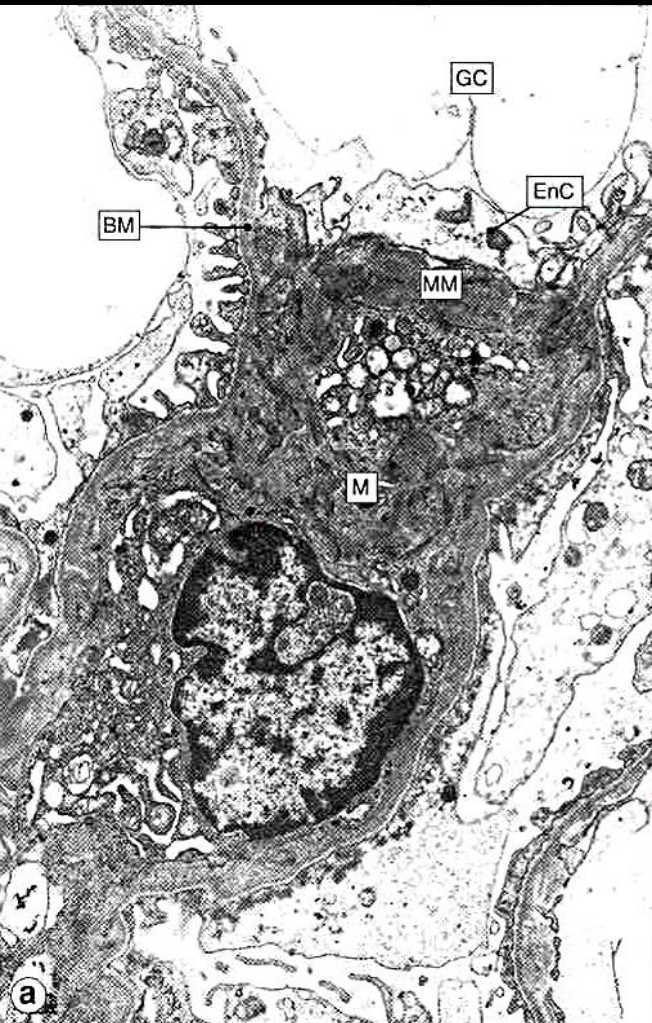


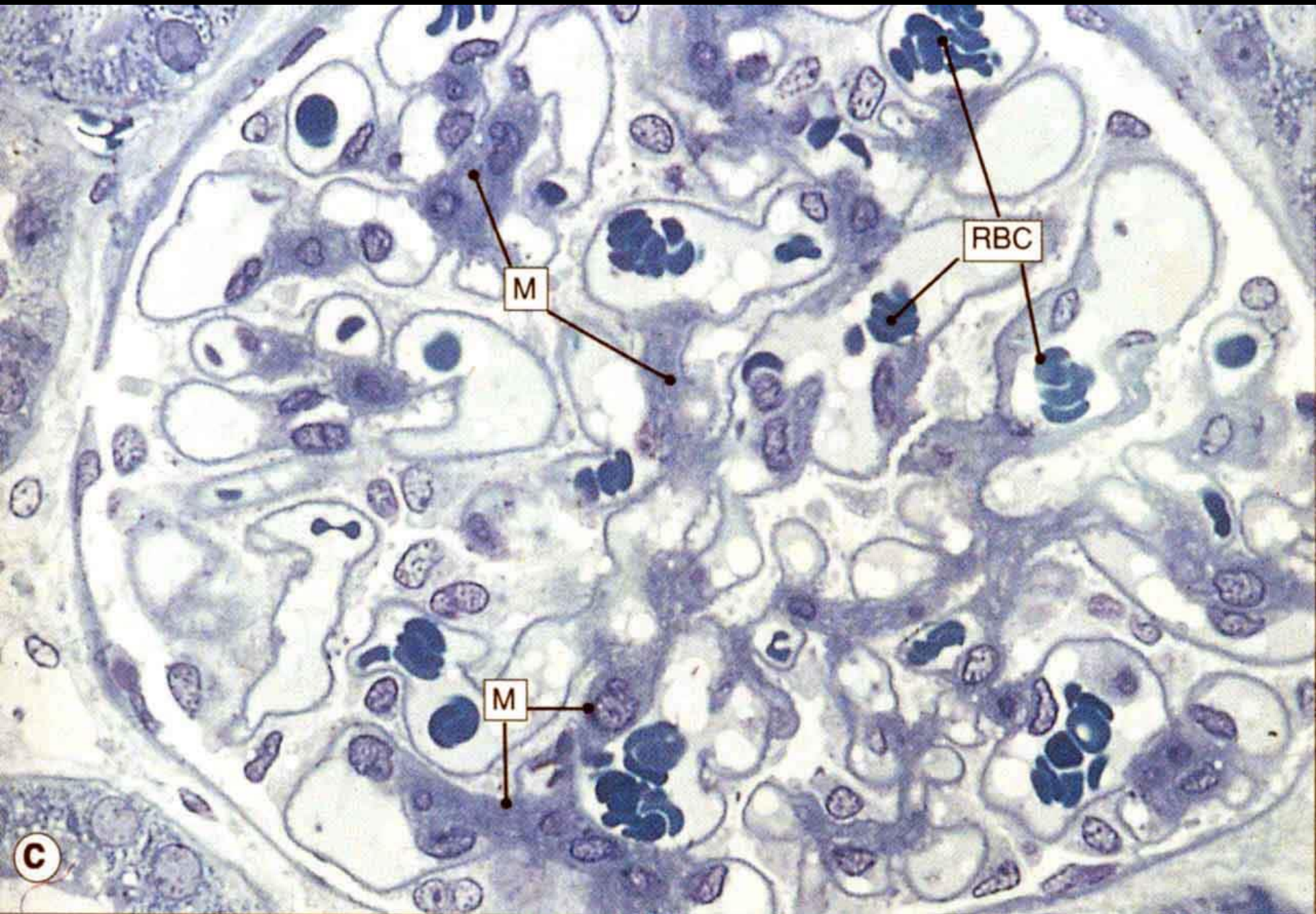

extracellular mesangial matrix

- a) phagocytose large protein molecular debris, which may accumulate during filtration
- b) can also contract- decreasing the surface area available for filtration
- c) possess receptors for angiotensin II and atrial natriuretic peptide
- d) matrix – support glomerular capillaries
- e) cleaning of BL





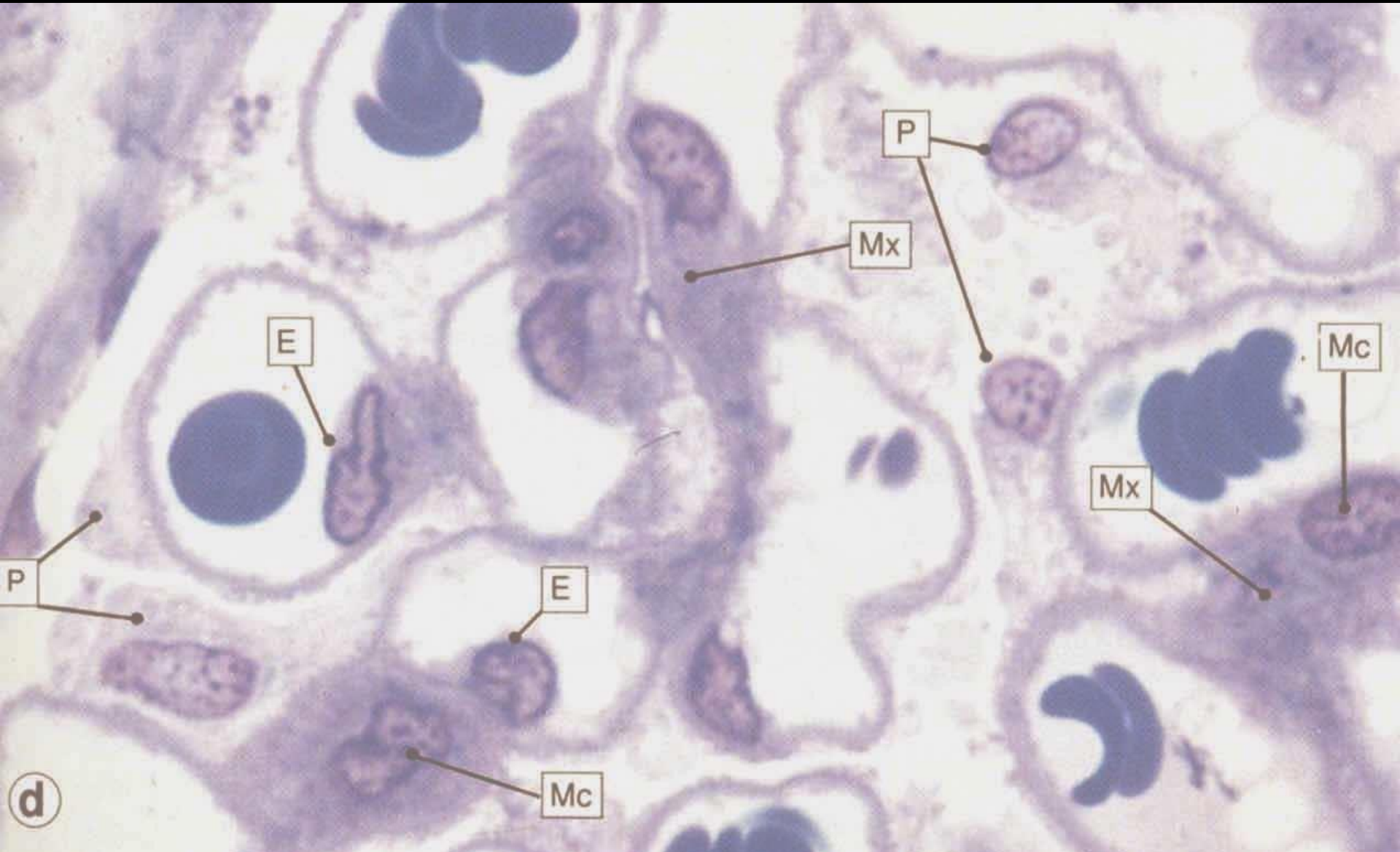

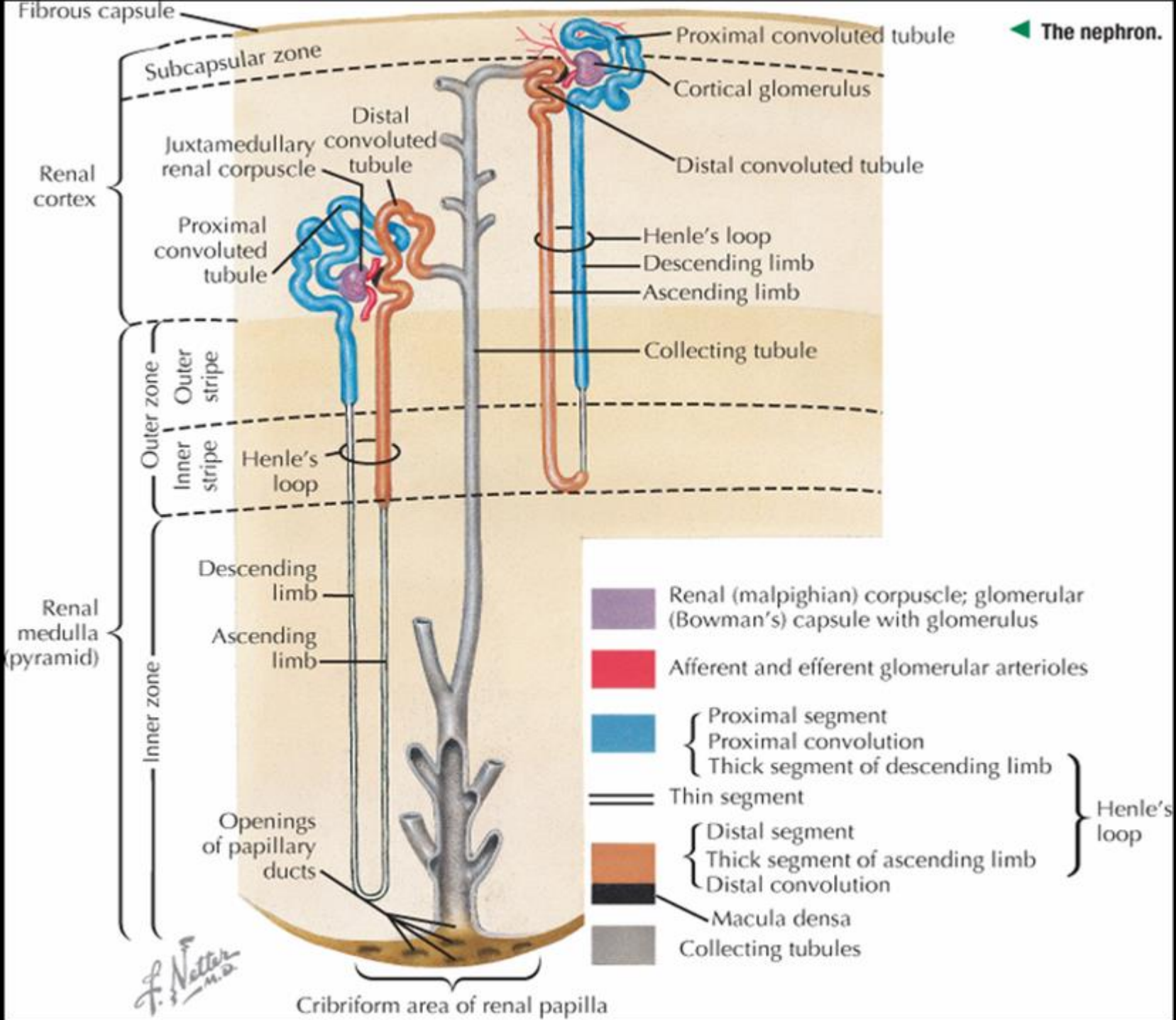


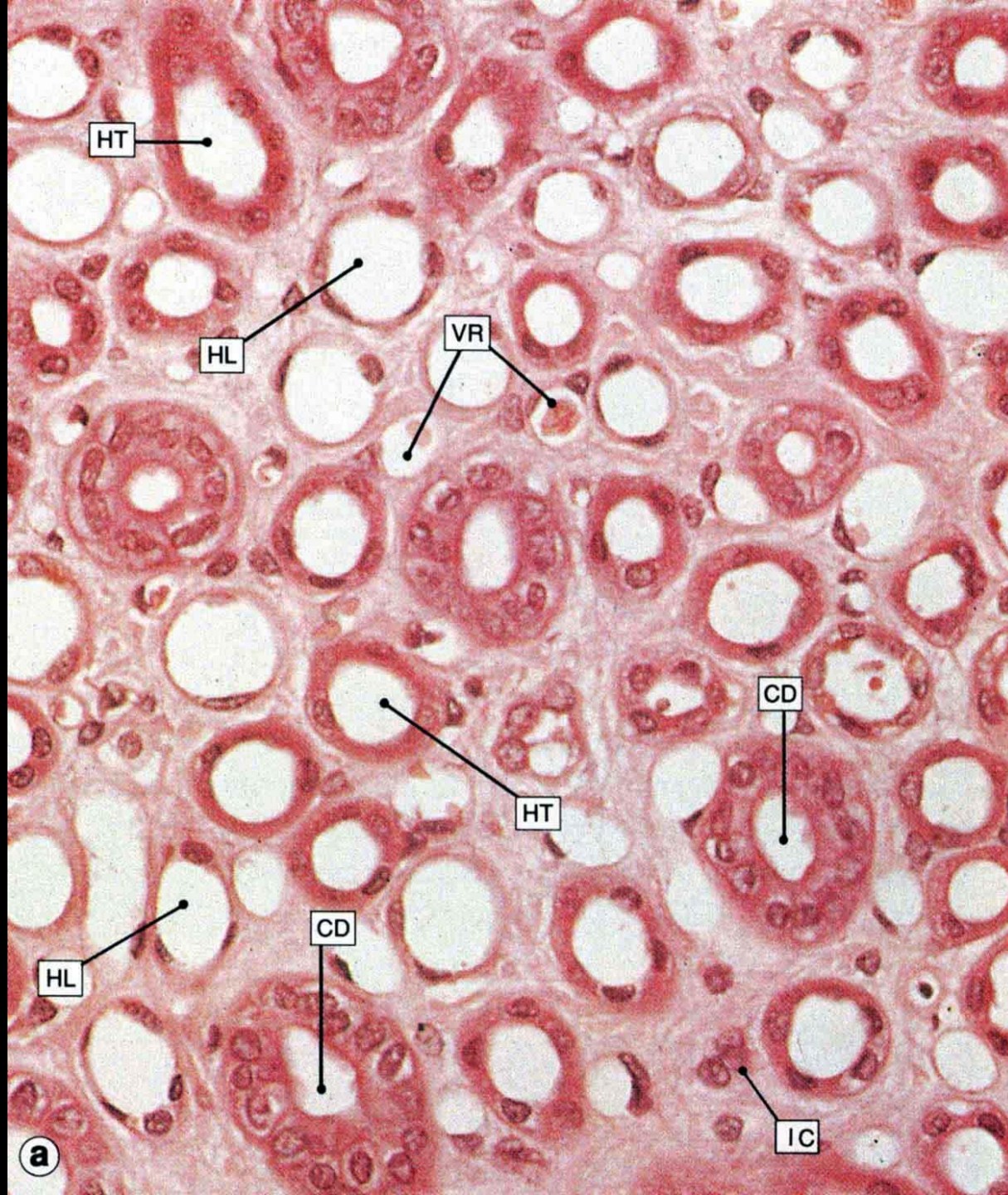
# Loop of Henle

## *Ansa nephroni Henlei*

- 3 morphological parts
  - pars recta tubuli proximalis
  - tubulus intermedius
  - pars recta tubuli distalis
- differ in length
  - juxtamedullary nephrons have long loop of henle
  - cortical nephrons: short loop of henle
- parts:
  - thick descending limb
  - thin descending limb
  - thin ascending limb
  - thick ascending limb

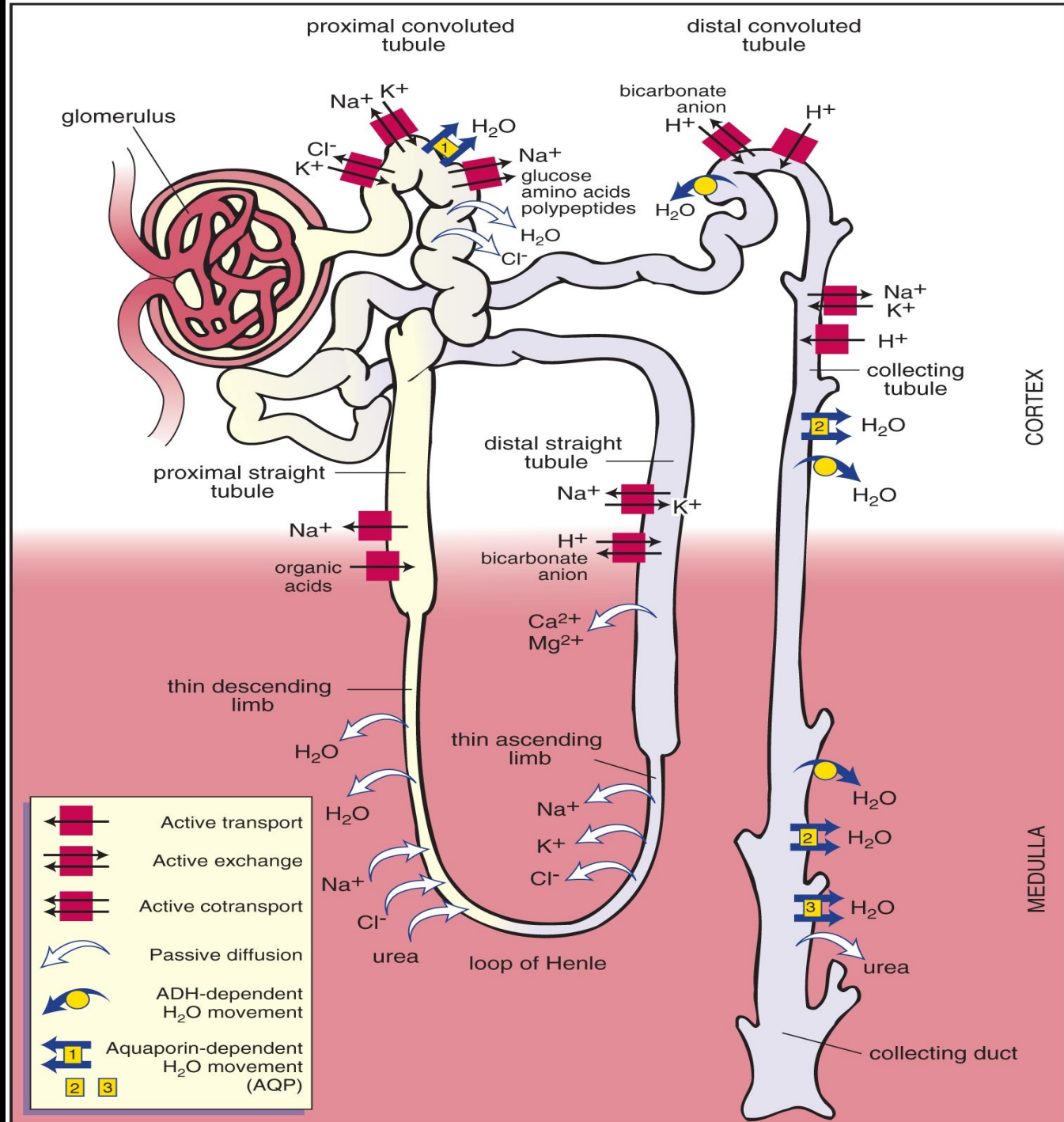




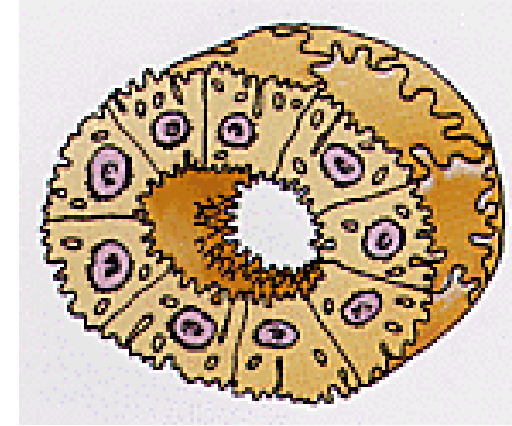

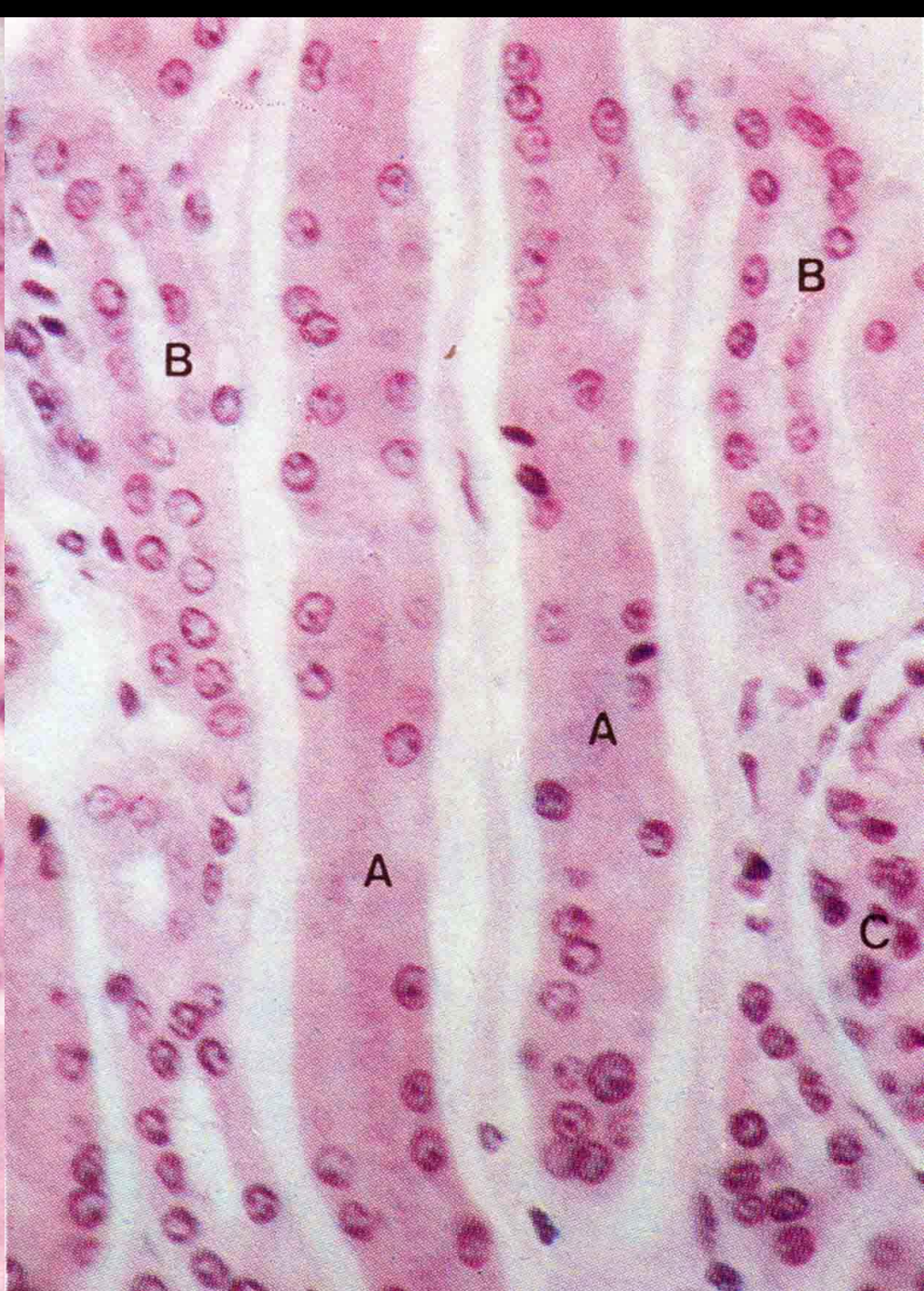
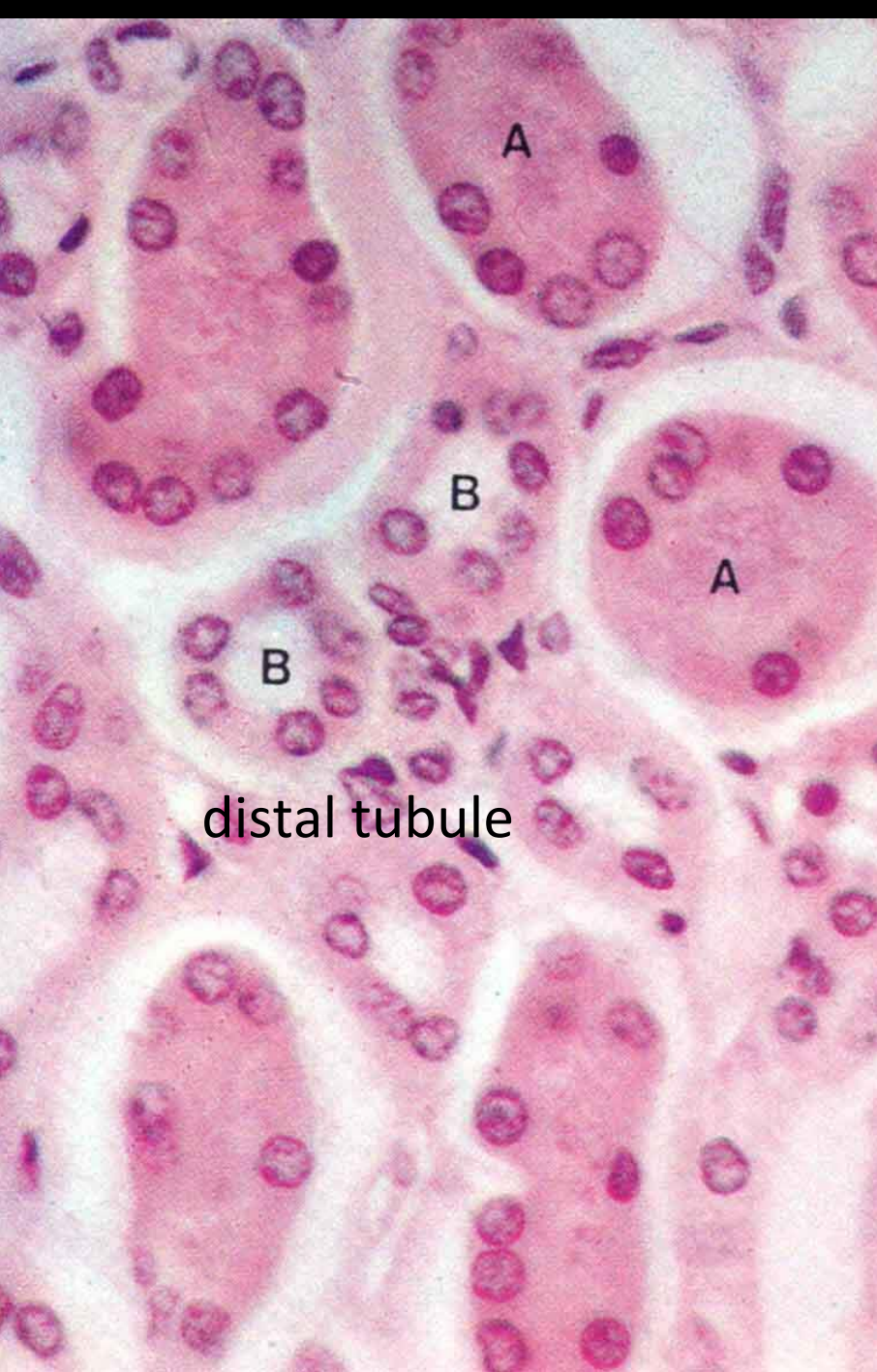


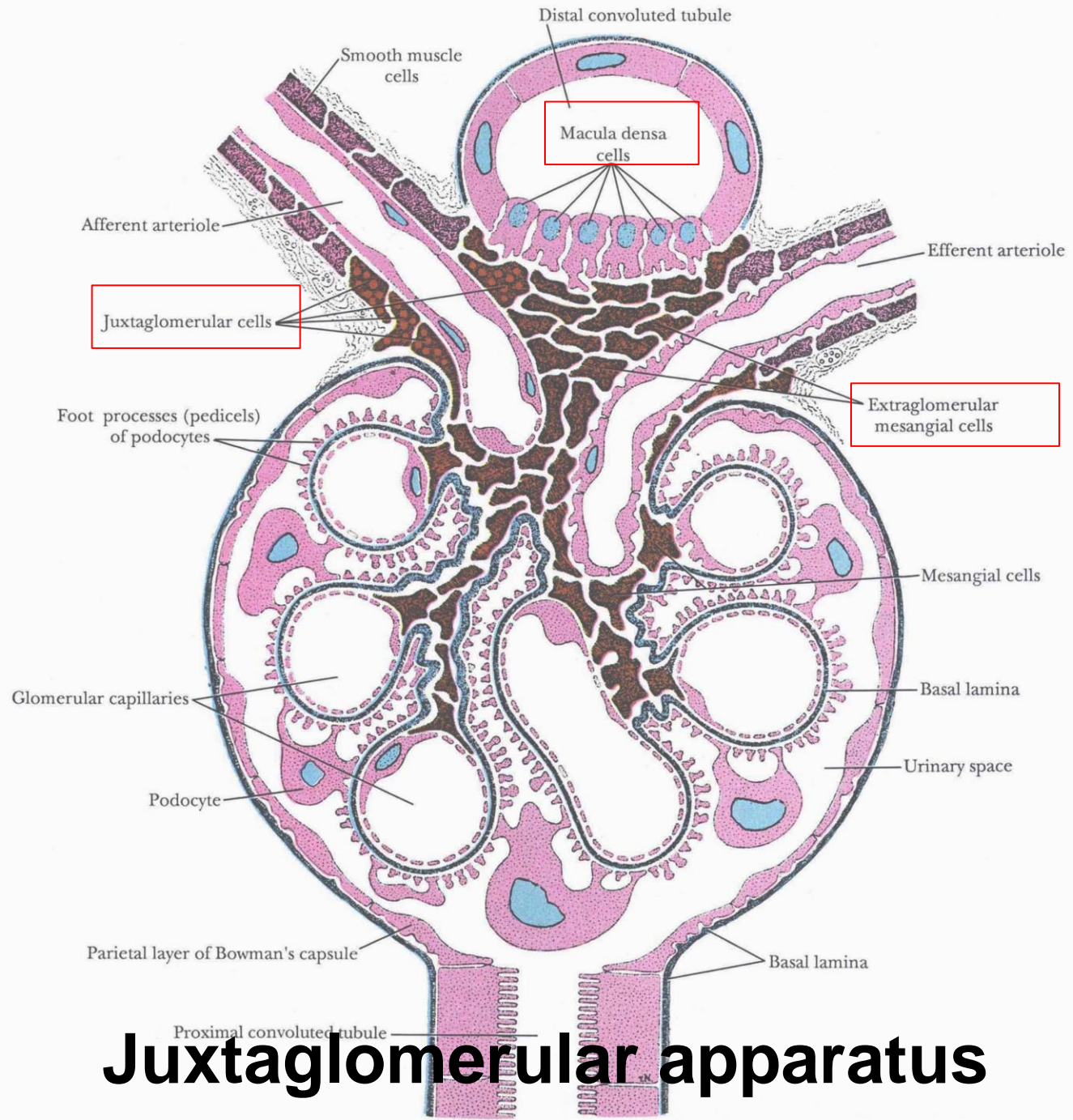


# Distal tubule



- **simple cuboidal epithelium**
  - smaller cells compared to proximal tubule
  - no brush border
  - basolateral labyrinth ( $\text{Na}^+$ - $\text{K}^+$ -ATPase)
  - mitochondria
- **reabsorption of Na, secretes  $\text{K}^+$** 
  - aldosterone
- **macula densa**
  - chemoreceptors ( $\text{Cl}^-$  and  $\text{Na}^+$ )



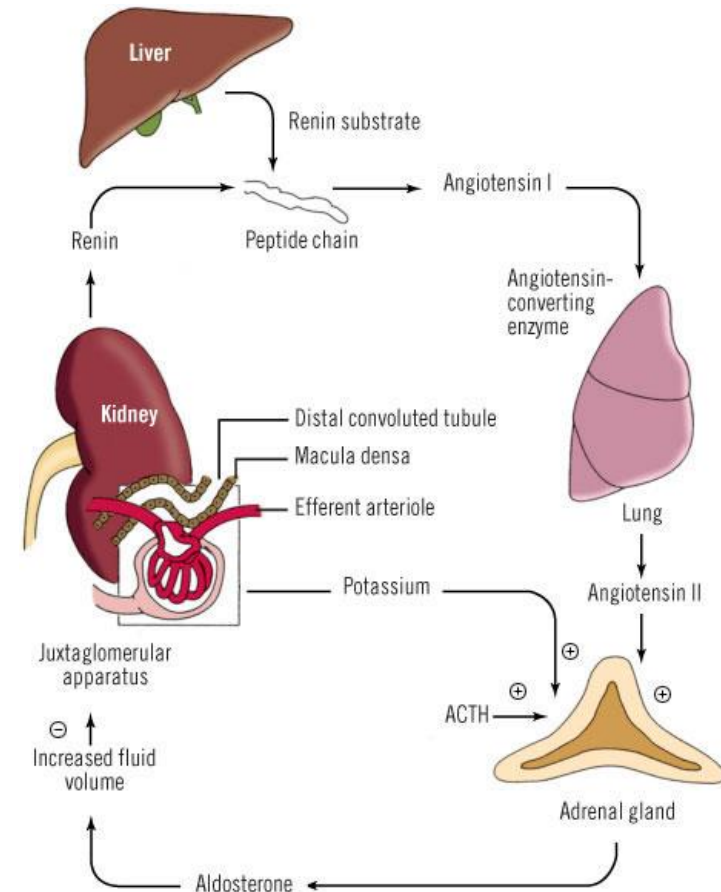

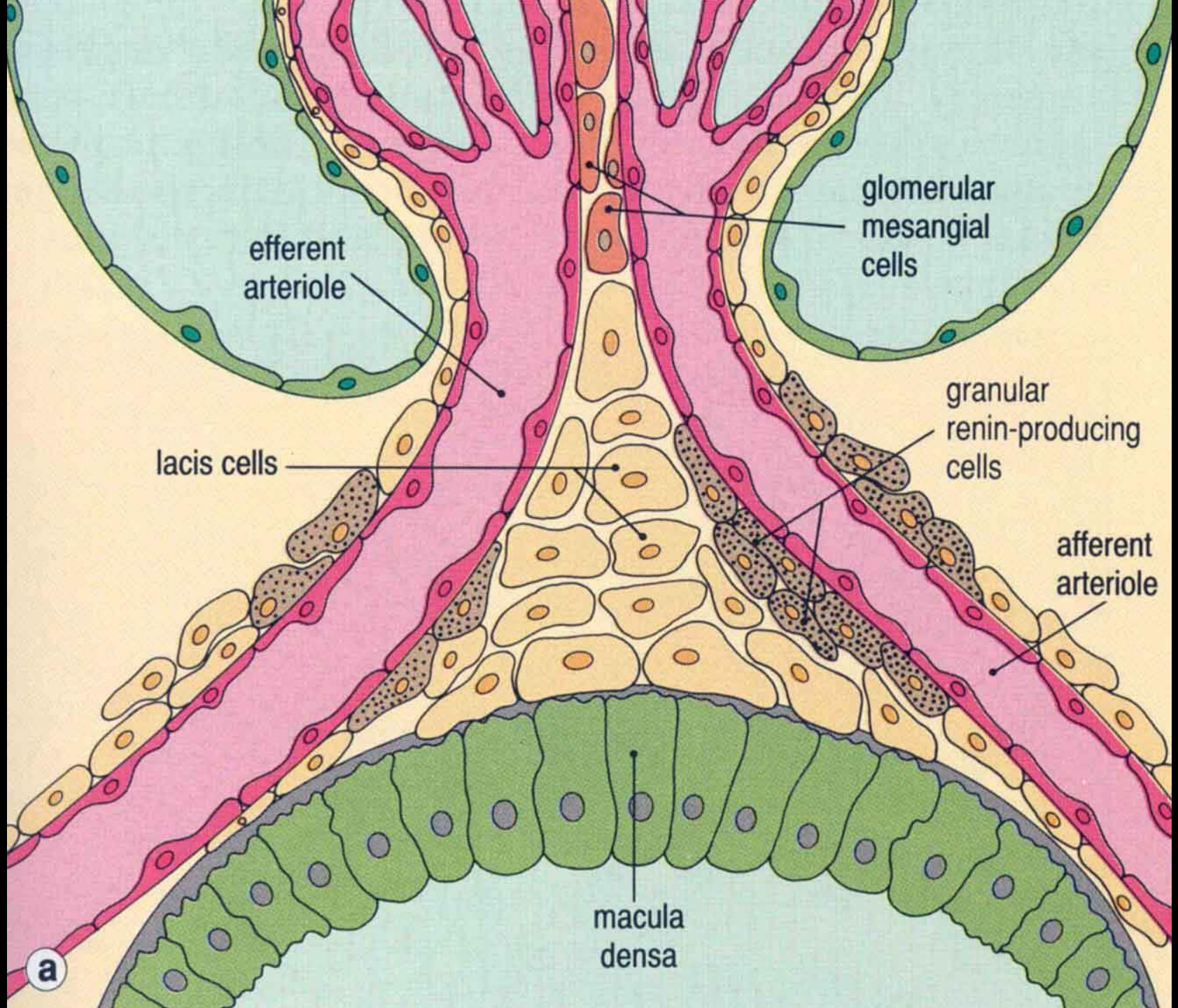

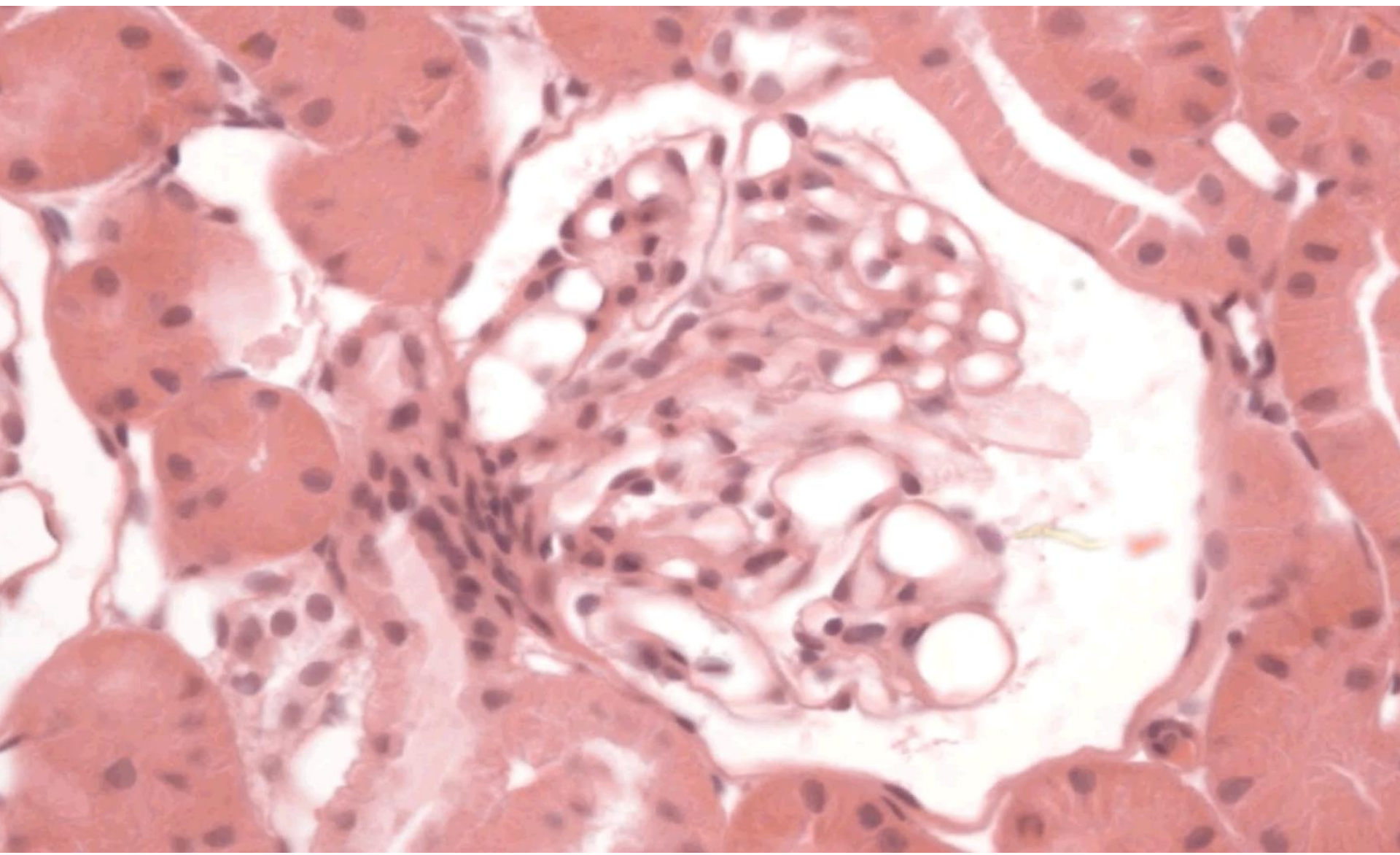
## *Complexus juxtaglomerularis*

- **juxtaglomerular** cells arteriola afferens + efferens
  - smooth muscle cells of tunica media
  - mechanoreceptors
  - produce renin
- **macula densa** distal tubule
  - chemoreceptors
- extraglomerular **mesangial** cells (Lacis cell)
- function:
  - **blood pressure regulation**
  - system **renin-angiotensin-aldosteron** (RAA)



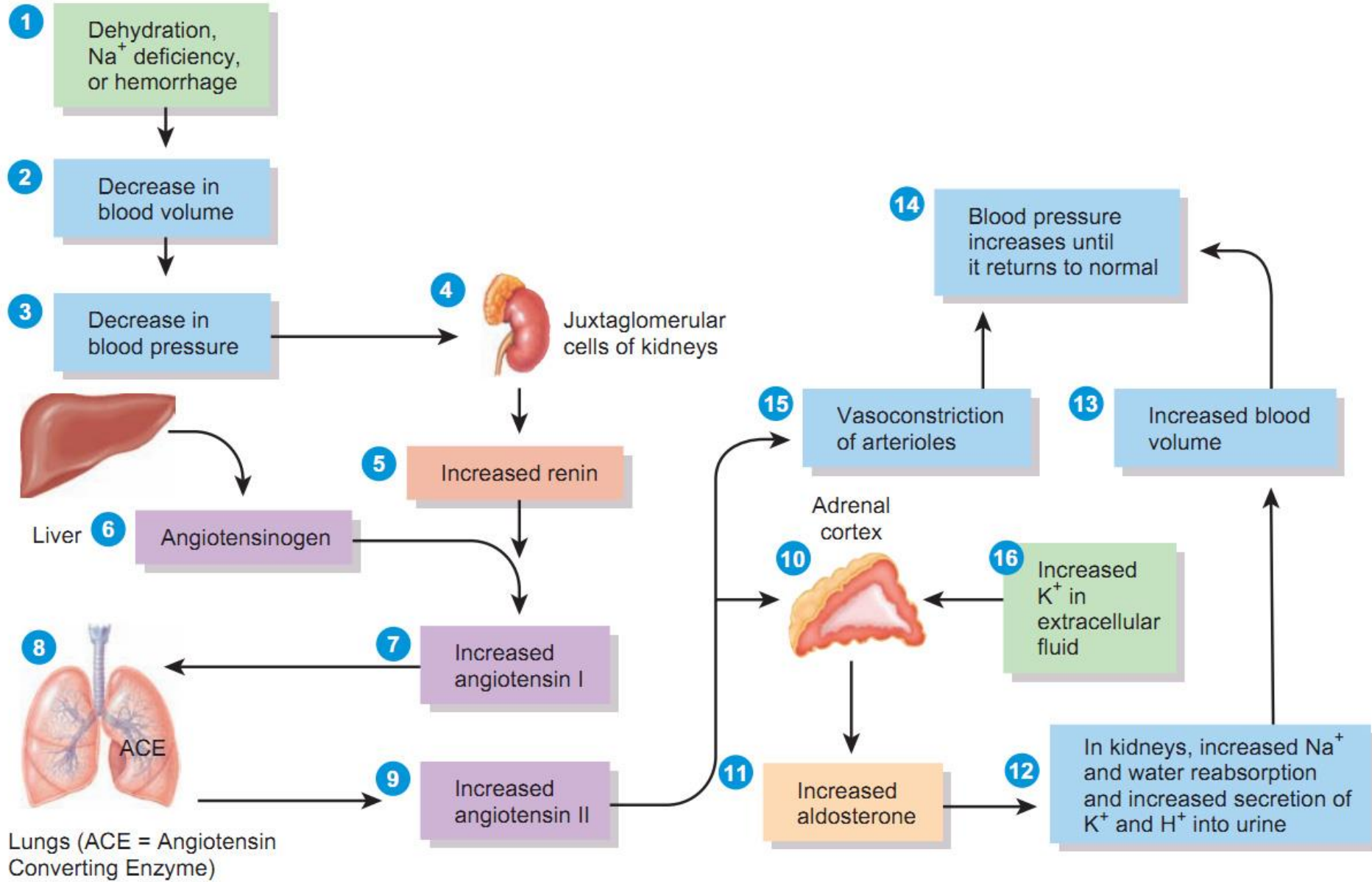




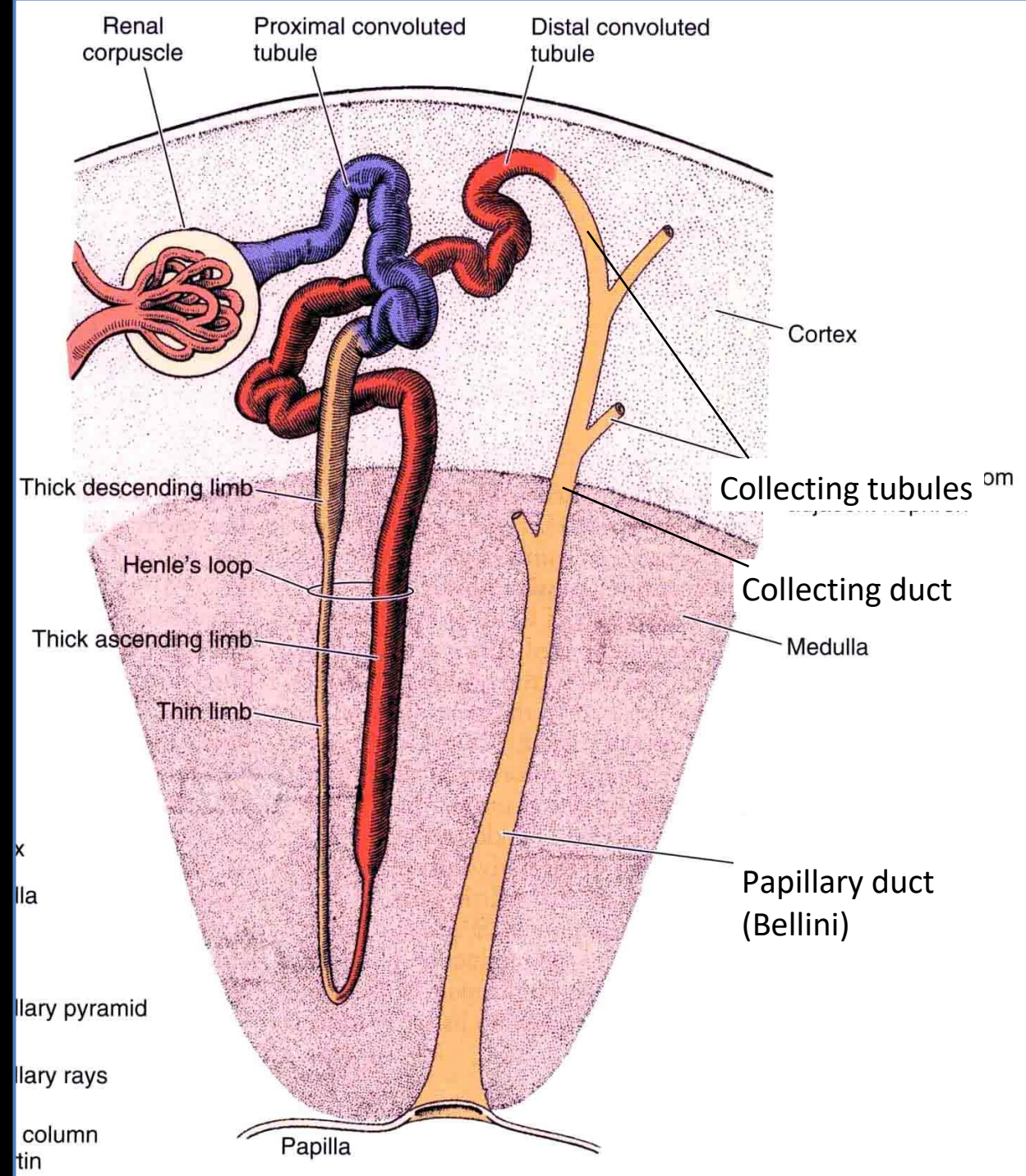


## Regulation of aldosterone secretion by the renin–angiotensin–aldosterone (RAA) pathway.

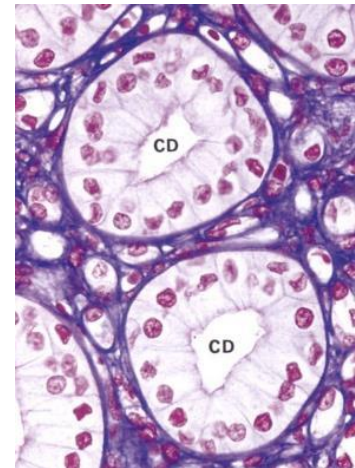
Aldosterone helps regulate blood volume, blood pressure, and levels of  $\text{Na}^+$ ,  $\text{K}^+$ , and  $\text{H}^+$  in the blood.

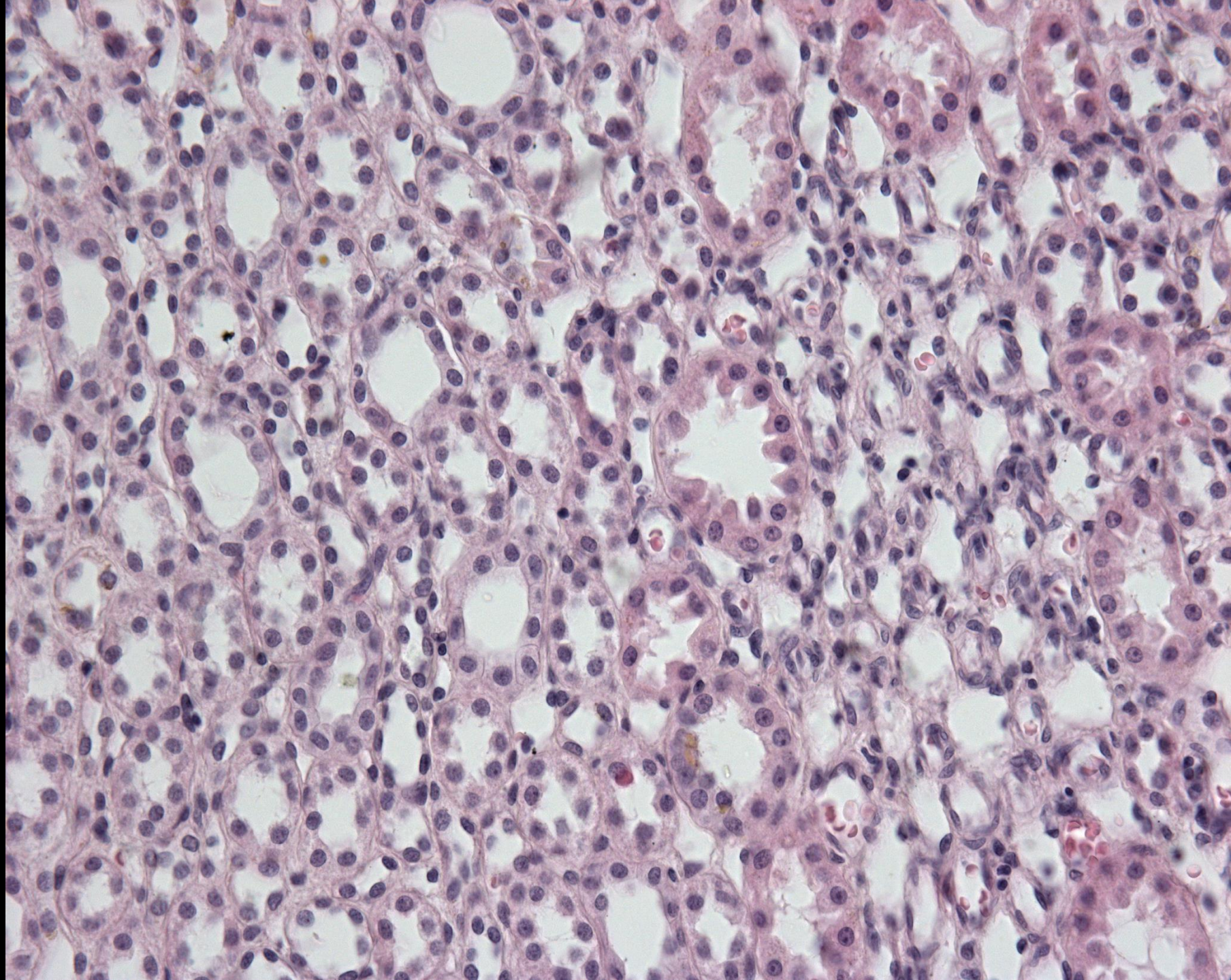


# Collecting tubules and ducts (Tubuli et ductus colligentes)

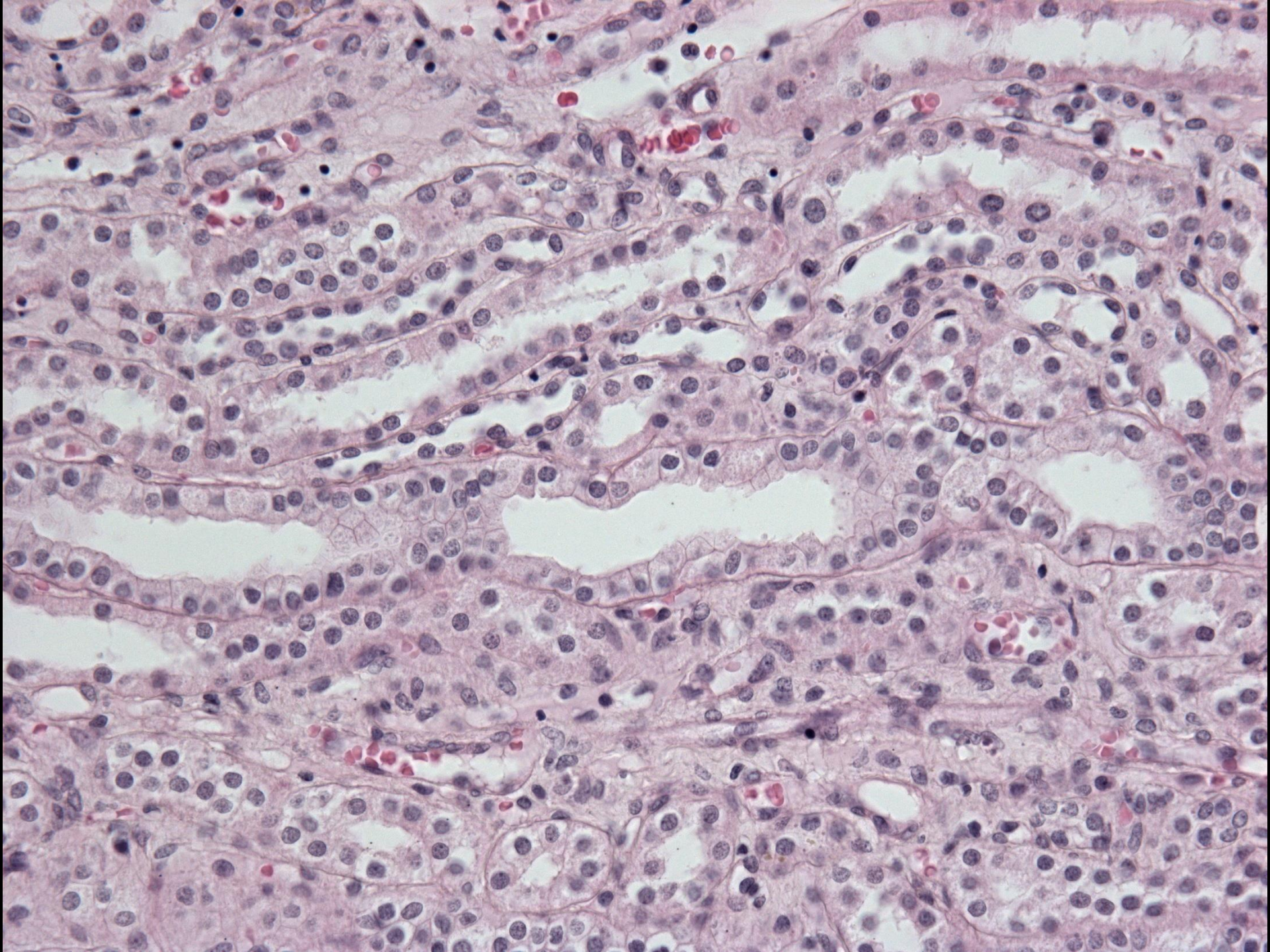


- collecting tubule (*tubulus reuniens, colligens*)
  - small tubule between distal tubule and the duct
- *collecting duct*
  - in medulla (radii medullares)
  - simple cuboidal epithelium
  - water reabsorption – **antidiuretic hormone** (adiuretin, vazopresin) = ADH
    - aquaporins
- **papillary duct** (*ductus papillaris Bellinī*)
  - simple columnar epithelium
  - opens to area cribrosa papillae renalis

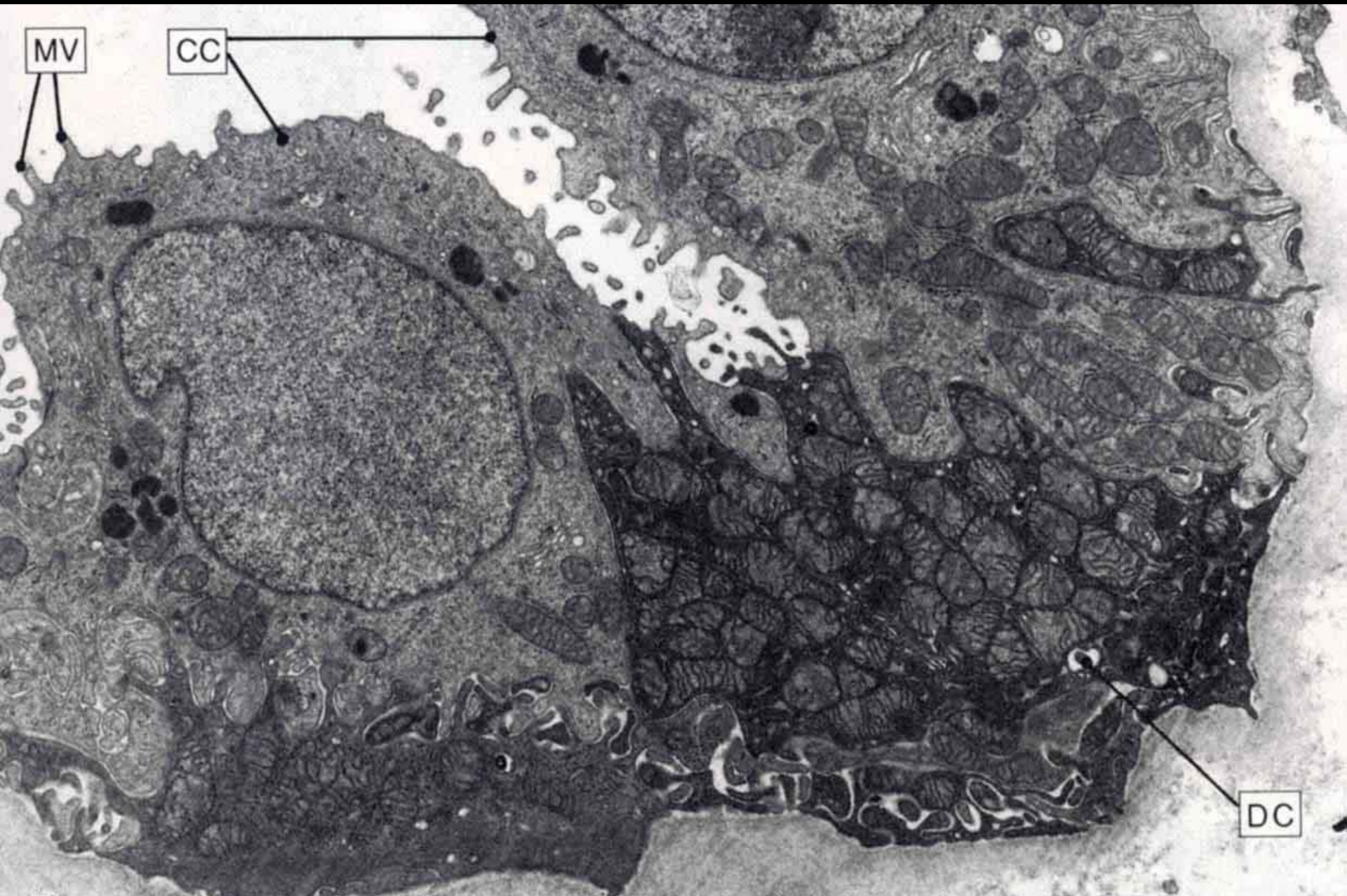


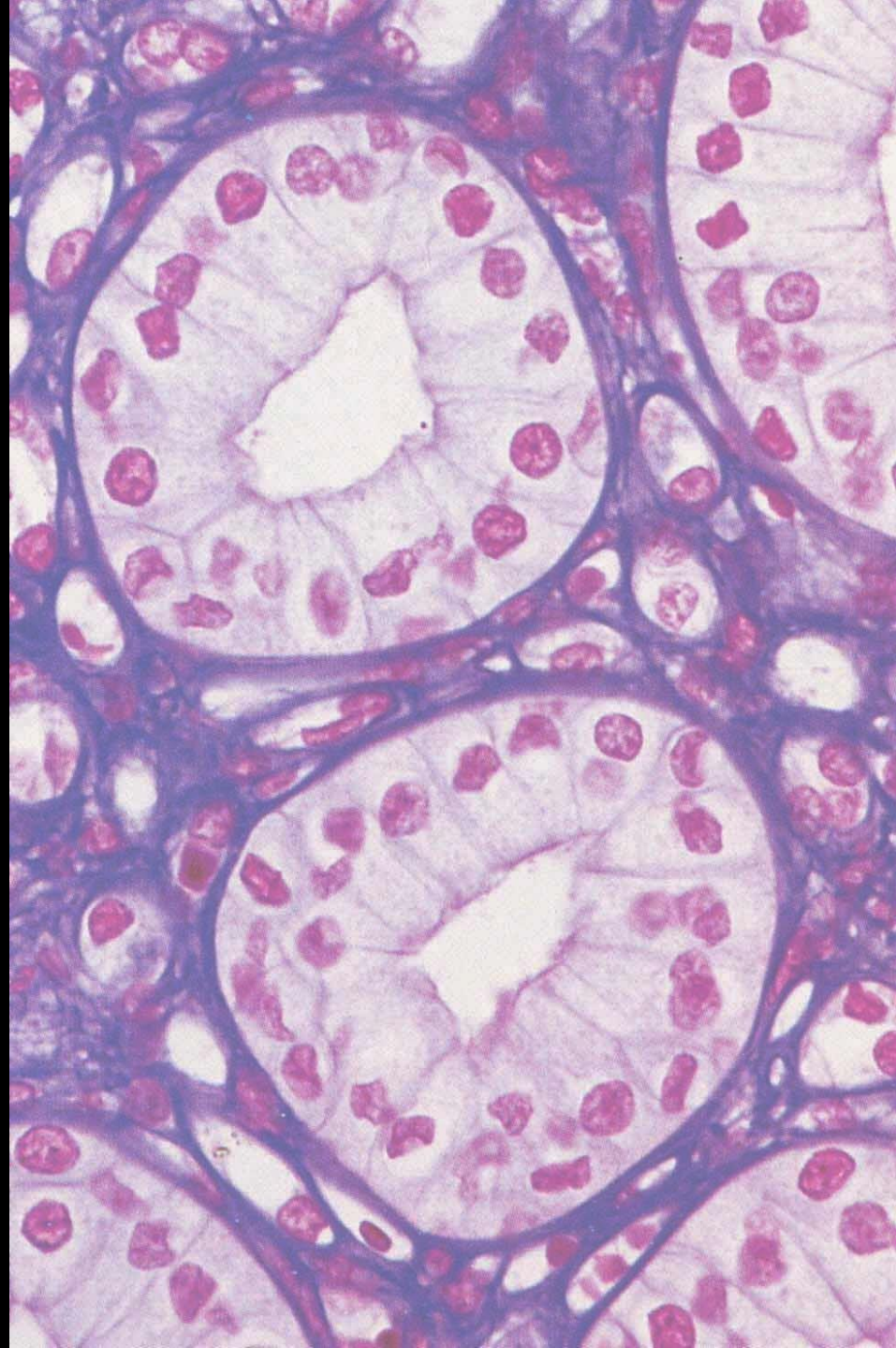










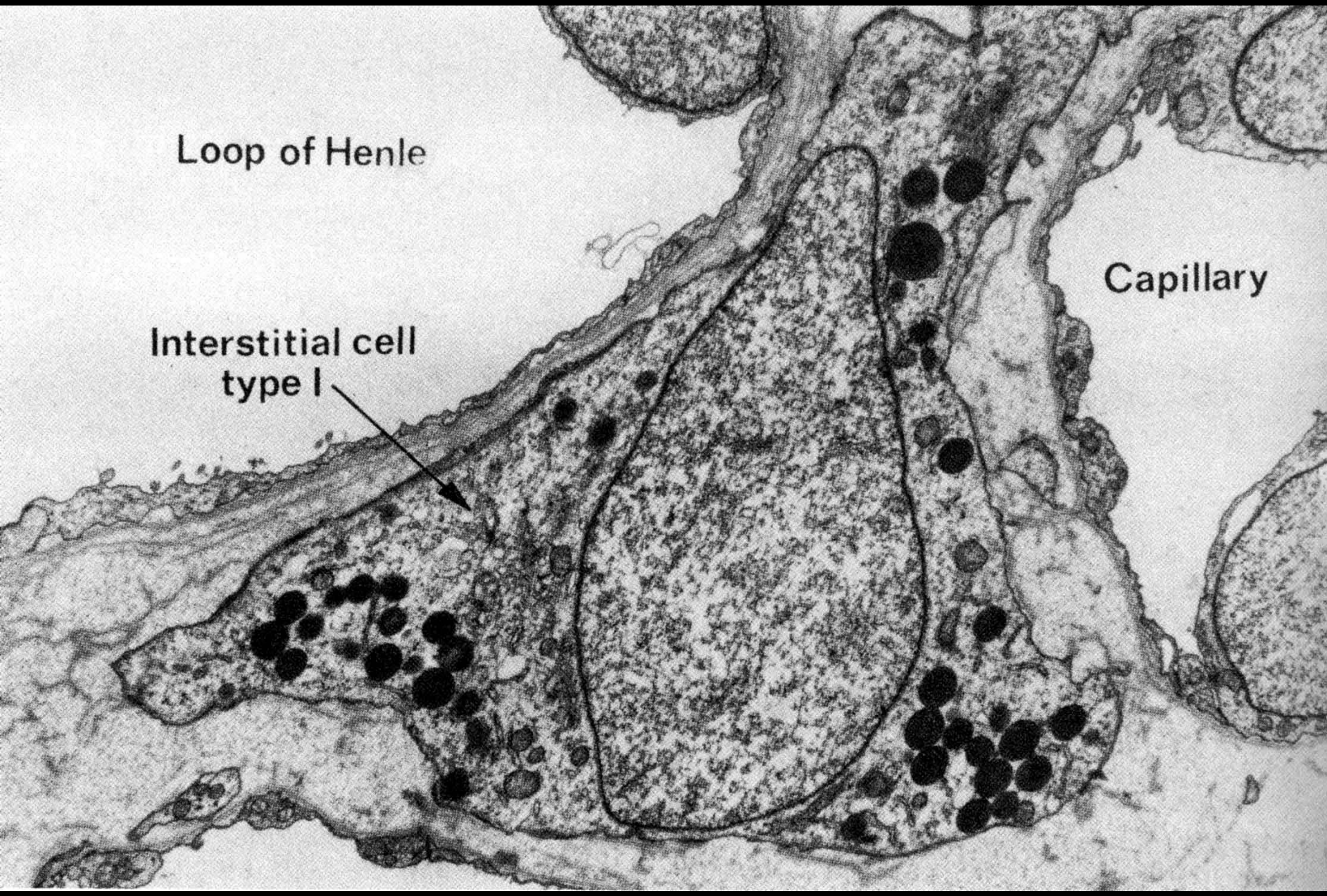
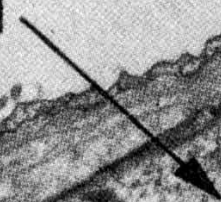




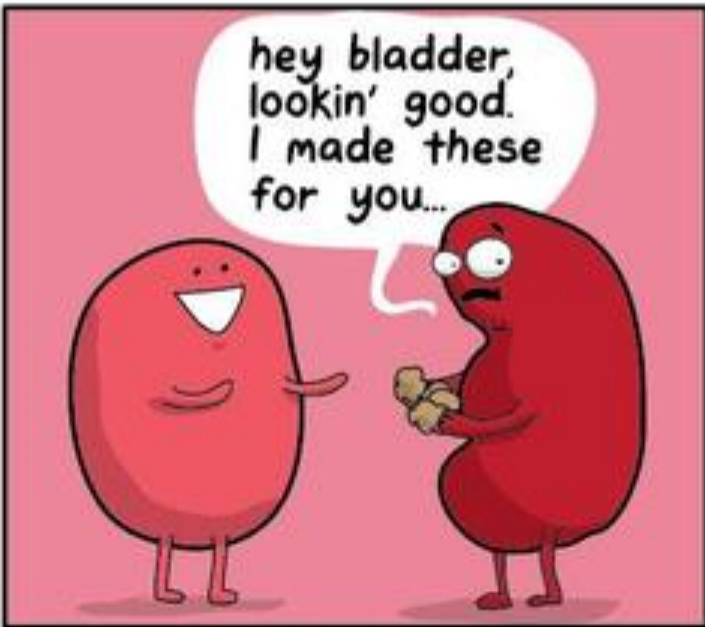

Immunofluorescence Microscopy (right)

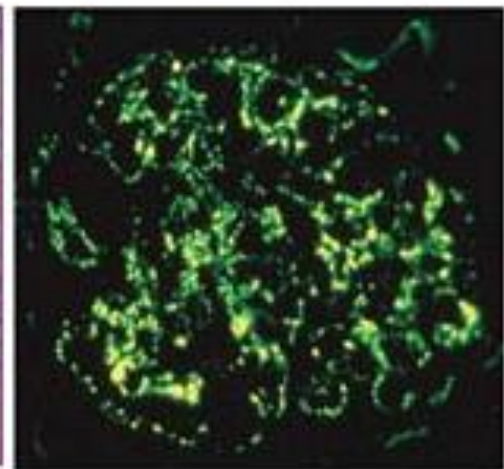

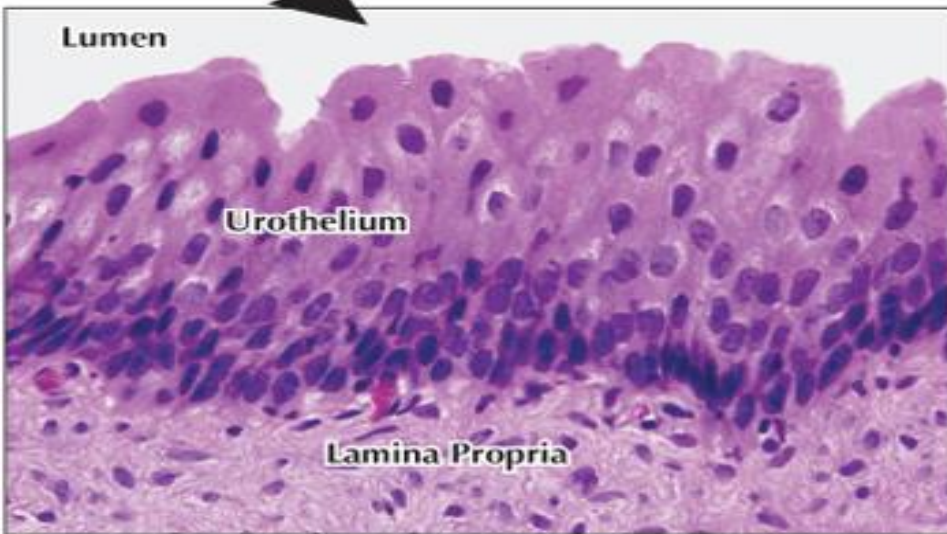




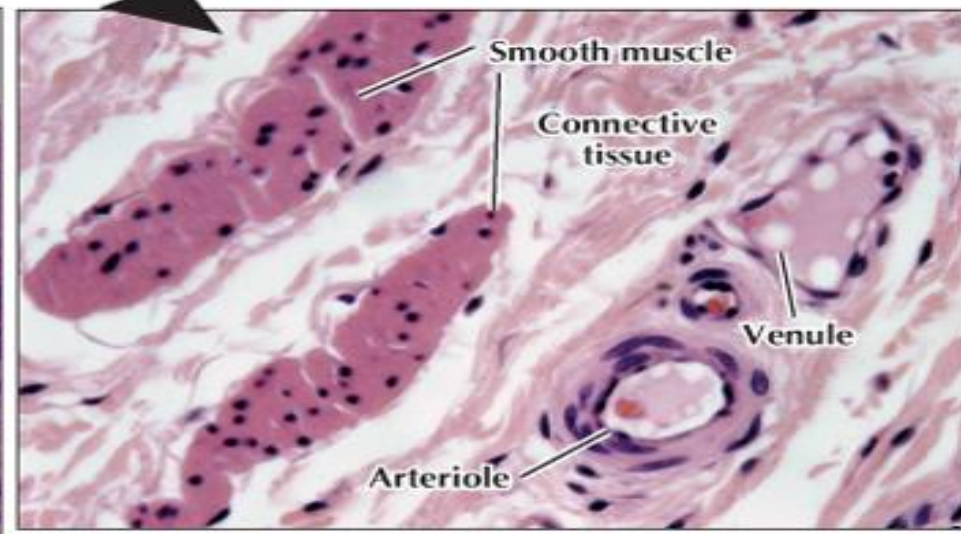


◀ **LM of the wall of the urinary bladder in transverse section.** The mucosa, according to the degree of distention, may look corrugated, with irregular longitudinal folds created by shape changes. Smooth muscle in the muscularis externa is thicker than that of the ureter. The superior bladder surface is covered externally by a serosa of peritoneum rather than by adventitia, the usual outer layer in the rest of the bladder. The serosa consists of connective tissue covered externally by thin, simple squamous epithelium made of a continuous layer of mesothelial cells (not seen at this magnification). 17×. H&E.

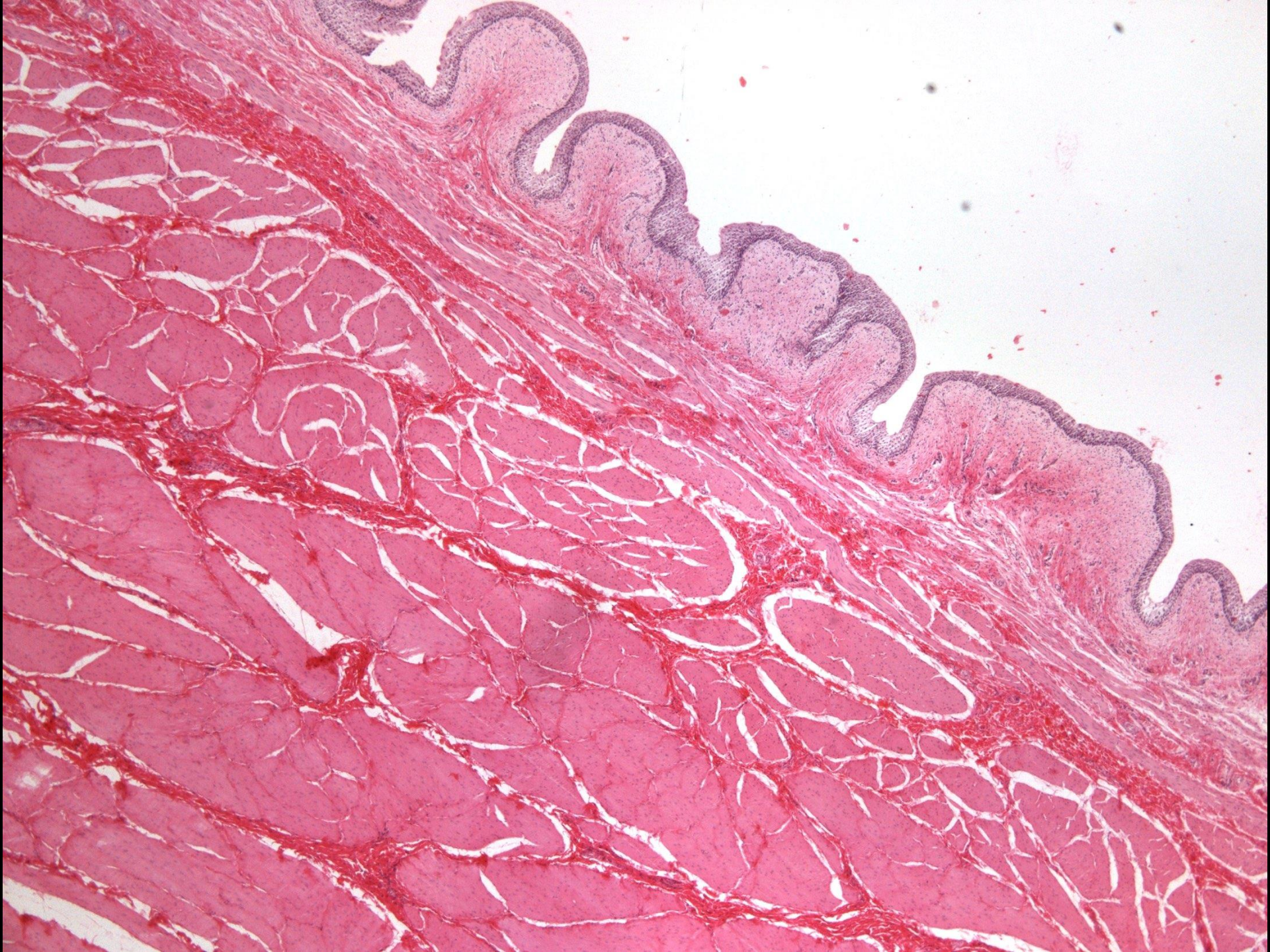
## Urinary bladder (vesica urinaria)



▲ **LM of the mucosa of the bladder at high magnification.** In the empty bladder the urothelium has an increased thickness—up to 8-10 cell layers. The lamina propria is highly fibrous with scattered connective tissue cells and a few capillaries. 420×. H&E.



▲ **LM of part of the muscularis externa of the bladder at high magnification.** Fibrous connective tissue surrounds irregular smooth muscle cell bundles. An arteriole and venule are in the area. 420×. H&E.




# Male urethra (Urethra masculina)

- Pars intramuralis (in muscle wall of urinary bladder)
- Pars prostatica (4 cm)
- Pars diaphragmatica (membranacea, intermedia, 1 cm)
- Pars spongiosa (15 cm)
- Proximal 2 parts = transitional epithelium
- Distal parts = stratified columnar
- In fossa navicularis - transition into stratified squamous nonkeratinized

A histological section of the male urethra stained with hematoxylin and eosin (H&E). The image shows the stratified squamous epithelium of the urethra, with several cross-sections of Littre's glands (paraurethral glands) visible. These glands are characterized by their circular or oval shape and the presence of a central lumen. The surrounding tissue consists of dense, fibrous connective tissue with scattered nuclei of fibroblasts and other cells. The overall appearance is that of a well-organized, multi-layered epithelial structure with associated glandular components.

# Female urethra (Urethra feminina)

- About 4 cm
- Proximal segment lined with urothelium
- Further stratified squamous nonkeratinized
- Glandulae paraurethrales (Skenei) - mucous
